

THE BIGGEST SHIP.

She Will Take 1,000,000 Gallons of Oil to Japan.

Philadelphia Press. The brand new ship Rappahannock, the largest wooden vessel ever built, arrived here some days ago from Bath, Me., where she was built at a cost of \$125,000. Such a complete specimen of marine architecture never floated up the Delaware, and she was heartily saluted by all the vessels in the harbor irrespective of nationality as she glided past the city front. Her dimensions are 287 feet long, 48 1/2 feet beam, and her total tonnage 3033 net. In the construction of this big ship 780 tons of Virginia oak and 1,200,000 feet of Virginia pine timber were used. The frame is of oak and well seasoned when put up, and the first quality of Georgia pine was used in the ceiling, deck, frames and planking. The main keelson is 3 feet 2 inches in depth, 34 feet keelsons, 14 inches flush, lower deck beams, 15x15; between beams 12x14; upper deck beams 12x14; and the spar deck beams at the main hatchway are 18x18; the decks are of yellow pine and the quarter deck extends forward to the mainmast.

The Rappahannock is the heaviest sparred ship that ever floated the Stars and Stripes. Her mainmast is 89 feet long and 38 1/2 inches in diameter; the foremast is 38 feet long and 28 inches in diameter; the main topmast, 68 feet; main top-gallant mast, 71 feet; main yard, 95 feet; fore yard, 95 feet; lower main top-sail yard, 87 feet; lower main top-gallant yard, 70 feet; upper main top-gallant yard, 64 feet; main royal yard, 53 feet; main skysail yard, 43 feet. The lower masts are of Georgia pine and the other spars of Oregon pine. The ship has a steel bowsprit, which is an innovation. It has no jibboom. Her spread of canvas will be 15,000 yards.

On August 14th last, while President Harrison was in Bath, the keel of this huge ship had just been laid, and he visited the yard and walked on the keel its entire length. In the handsome cabin hangs a photograph of President Harrison, with the inscription in the President's own handwriting: "May every voyage of the ship Rappahannock be prosperous. Benjamin Harrison."

The Rappahannock will load 1,200,000 gallons of oil for Japan, the largest cargo of the kind ever exported. When loaded she will draw twenty-eight feet of water.
