The Willamette Valley proper is about 150 miles long and forty wide. This area is about 6000 square miles, but by going up into the foothills a considerable altitude this area is easily increased to 10,000 square miles.

The area of the whole water shed of the Willamette river is full 15,000 square miles. This is larger than Connecticut, with 4900 square miles, Delaware 2050, Maryland 12,210, Massachusetts 8315, New Hampshire 9305, New Jersey 7815, Rhode Island 1250 and Vermont 9665 miles.

In excavating for the addition to the woolen mill, says the Oregon City Enterprise, the shovelers came across numerous relics that had been kept by the Hudson Bay Company in the early history of Oregon for replenishing the old flint lock guns then in vogue.
