OVER 100 DEAD AT LOUISVILLE. A Storm of Huge Hail Storms Kills Many People. LOSS WILL REACH MILLIONS. The News, Slowly Coming in, Shows a Widespread Devastation in Kentucky, Illinois and Tennessee.

A SEA OF WATER. THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER OVERFLOWING THE COUNTRY.

Houses Inundated—Great Damage to Plantations—People Fleeing for Their Lives. GREENVILLE, Miss., March 29.—The storm, Thursday, drew the waters of the swollen Mississippi over the levee here and caused great crevasses where the embankment was previously thought to be secure.

STREETS WITH WRECKAGE. The river is strewn with floating debris from the storm and from the wreckage of the levee.
