

MONMOUTH NOTES.

MONMOUTH, March 31. A new Babistry was put in the church last week. The protected meeting closed with twenty-seven conversions, five being students. It has been decided to name the new town Talmage, which has been laid out between this place and Independence. The public school has increased so much since the house was built two years ago, that it is necessary to make an addition to it, there being 120 pupils enrolled this winter. The Pansy society, composed of the little girls of the public school, between the ages of eight and twelve, sent an invitation to the Normalites to attend their entertainment at the opera house Saturday evening. The Utopians elected the following officers for the ensuing term: Iva Templeton, president; Ella Emmet, Vice-president; Jess Waldron secretary; Ada Redford, Assistant secretary; Jennie McPherson Corresponding secretary; Cecil McCulloch, and Myra Smith, Editors; Cora Smith, Martial; Tiltha Miles, Critic. The S. S. convention held here this week was well attended, Rev. N. Shupp of the Evangelical church was elected president for the ensuing year. Prof. P. L. Campbell Vice-president, Co. Superintendent, W. I. Reynolds, secretary. Rev. Wells of the First Presbyterian church, lectured on S. S. work the last evening. This being the first convention held in the county it was much better attended than was anticipated, and was quite a success. Twenty-one delegates from abroad were present. The disturbance at the Normal is quieting down, about the scandal of President and Prof. Doughty. The trustees were called in and after forty-eight hours examination could find no positive evidence of any improper conduct on the part of the professors. The boys were dismissed from school who started the report. President Stanley afterwards resigned his position as president of the O. S. N. S. and his resignation accepted. No successor has yet been appointed.
