THE SOUTH SUFFERS.

People Again Driven from Their Homes by the Floods.

AN ENTIRE TOWN SUBMERGED.

The Anti-Prohibition Movement in Iowa—The Election in Rhode Island—Sullivan and Jackson.

NEW ORLEANS, April 3.—The dispatches received here report that within the past two days unusually heavy rains have fallen throughout the lower Mississippi, Texas, Red River and Ouachita valley, accompanied by severe winds.

BASTROP, Texas, April 3.—The Bonny levee, 12 miles east of this place, which protects the richest part of this parish from overflow, broke today. It is feared the lower country will be inundated.

Vicksburg, April 3.—A telephone message from Maryland has just been received announcing that the entire town and surrounding country has been overtopped by a sudden rise in the river. In Steele's bayou the people are moving out of their homes and taking refuge in gin houses. The water is over three feet deep in the higher levels of the town and is rising fast.

WHAT CLARKSON SAYS

About the Anti-Prohibition Movement in Iowa.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—In an interview today regarding the anti-prohibition movement in Iowa First Assistant Postmaster General Clarkson said:

"The prohibition law has had seven years of trial, and where it proved an admirable law for smaller towns it has failed in large cities.

The republicans have never been united in support of the measure. Fifty or sixty thousand republicans opposed it, but have gone along with the party, willing to see the experiment tried.

Now that it has been tried, and failed in part, they insist that the law be amended.

The demand in yesterday's convention for a silent platform will not be successful.

IN RHODE ISLAND.

The Result of the Recent Election—Somewhat Mixed.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., April 3.—The next legislature, as far as chosen, stands:

Senate—Republicans 21, democrats 11, to be chosen 21.

House—Republicans 24, democrats 25, to be chosen 25.

The election of governor and general officers is thrown into the legislature and 55 votes are needed to assure a majority of the assembly members to be elected at the supplementary election. The republicans must get 10 or the democrats 19 to secure a majority to elect state officers.

SULLIVAN AND JACKSON.

The Gladiators Will Probably Meet Soon in New York.

NEW YORK, April 3.—It is not improbable that the meeting of Sullivan and Jackson may take place in the Puritan club. It is stated that the directors of the club are willing to put up a purse of \$25,000 to secure the meeting of the gladiators.

CHINESE LEAVING NEW YORK.

They Were Driven Out by White Laundrymen.

NEW YORK, April 3.—Over sixty Chinese have sold their handcart in this city and left in a body for Hong Kong by way of British Columbia. The reason of their sudden flight is said to be fear of persecution from the association of white laundrymen.

TOO MUCH REFORM.

A New Organization Somewhat Visionary on the Subject.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—A Reform Conference organization, formed for the purpose of bringing religion into the settlement of political and state affairs, today adopted a platform declaring in favor of employing the teachings of the bible in the settlement of public affairs, and the insertion of the name of the Supreme Being in the constitution.

THE IMPULSIVE WOMEN.

They Want Money to Buy a Statue for France.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—A number of well known ladies, including the wives of Senators Jones, McMillan, Payne, Hearst and Mrs. William Ried, met yesterday and decided to issue an address, calling on the women of America for contributions for a bronze statue to be presented to France as a token of friendship.

A SAVAGE ATTACK.

Made by the Farmers' Alliance Upon the U. S. Supreme Court.

ST. PAUL, April 3.—The Farmers' Alliance met yesterday and after considering the recent "Granger" railroad decision of the United States supreme court, adopted resolutions attacking that court in an extraordinary manner. The resolutions characterize the decision as a second Dred Scott decision.

BEHRRING SEA DIFFICULTIES.

A British Captain Talks Learnedly About the Matter.

VICTORIA, B. C., April 3.—Capt. J. D. Warren, who has been to Washington in connection with the Behring sea difficulties, returned here last night. He says the talk at Washington is that the Americans do not claim the Behring sea as closed, and that they are trying to get the British minister to agree to long close season.

The want the closed season during the only months in which the Behring sea difficulties. These months are, it is said, June, July, August and September. He did not think Alaska could be required to observe this close season, but that it was a close season for outsiders.

CARRIER PIGEONS.

They Will Be Utilized by Canadians for Communicating with Ships.

KINGSTON, Ont., April 3.—General Cameron, of the Royal Engineers, commanding the Royal Military College here is organizing a system of messenger pigeon stations throughout Canada. He proposes that Canadian cruisers utilize the pigeons by having stations along the coast, and thus communicate news from postcoaches and fishing vessels.

THE FRENCH MINISTER.

He Believes That a European War Is Imminent.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 3.—A Washington special says: The visit to the capital of Whitelaw Reid, minister to France, has been a matter of more consequence than such visits usually are. Mr. Reid believes that a European war is impending, and that all the great powers desire the friendship of the United States.

CLEVELAND, April 3.—President McKinley, of the Non-Partisan Women's Christian Temperance Union, has issued a notice that Miss Mary F. Lathrop of Denver, Colorado, national organizer, will traverse the Pacific Coast in the interest of the society, commencing early in May.

The Strikers' Content.

CHICAGO, April 3.—The leaders of the striking plumbers assert that they are perfecting arrangements whereby in case their employers do not concede to their demands soon they will establish a co-operative shop with branches all over the city.

Brice Buys a Railroad.

PORT WATNEY, Ind., April 3.—Senator Calvin S. Brice, president of the Lake Erie & Western Railway, it is announced has purchased the Fort Wayne, Cincinnati & Louisville railway on his personal account.

The Kentucky Relief Fund.

LOUISVILLE, April 3.—Contributions to the relief fund amount to nearly \$150,000.

The Greeley Homestead Burned.

CHAPPAQUA, N. Y., April 3.—The Horace Greeley homestead caught fire and burned to the ground this morning.

The Prince of Wales.

PARIS, April 3.—The Prince of Wales is now in his way back from Berlin. The Prince is well and hearty. He looks and walks like a feeble man.

Henry M. Stanley.

LONDON, April 3.—Henry M. Stanley has sent the following cable: "I accept Emin Pasha's action as proof that he has recovered from his accident. I wish him bon voyage. The gospel of enterprise is spreading."

Colored Men Hanged.

SAVANNAH, Ga., April 3.—Will Hicks and Robert McCoy, both colored, were hanged at Homer today for the murder of Wm. Hughes and wife, an aged white couple, November 6 last.

Notable Death.

LONDON, April 3.—The Marquis of Normandy died today aged 72. At different times he had the governorship of Nova Scotia, Queensland, New Zealand and Victoria.

Prominent Citizen Dead.

THE DALES, April 3.—Hon. T. W. Slusher, receiver of the land office at this city, died today. Slusher was appointed by Cleveland in 1886.

A STORMY DEBATE.

The House Passes the Idaho Admission Bill.

OUR CHINESE POPULATION.

Debate on the Bill Providing for Their Enumeration in the Census of 1890—The Montana Election Contest.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—The house today passed the senate bill to enable the secretary of the treasury to gather full and authentic information as to the present condition and preservation of the fur seal interests of the government in the region of Alaska as compared with its condition in 1870; also full information as to the impending extinction of the sea otter industry. Also senate bill amending an article of war so as to provide that no person shall be tried or punished by court-martial in time of peace, committed more than two years before arraignment, unless the person shall in the meantime have absented himself from the United States.

The house then resumed the consideration of the Idaho admission bill.

Springer, of Illinois, said the majority of the committee on territories framed the Idaho bill in such a way as to secure a partisan legislation instead of a proper legislation to bring the state into the Union. The minority would offer an amendment providing that a new convention be held and the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people of the territory. The Edmunds-Facker test oath be taken by every person voting upon the constitution.

The gentleman on the other side said he thought the Idaho constitution disfranchising Mormons was in line with Edmunds-Tucker law. Under the Idaho constitution not a member of the Mormon church is allowed to vote. He charged the republicans with the purpose of admitting territories under such provisions as would insure an increase of their representation in the senate.

Henderson, of Iowa, said the attitude of the democratic party was a familiar sight to the country. The democratic party was in its old breeches pulling back when the civilized world cried, "Forward and onward!" He said the democratic party was a polyanist. It had a batch of wives. Slavery was one, slave territory another, treason another, derisive laughter on the democratic side. Mr. Henderson: "Oh, you recognize them, you know their names. And now you have polyanism for one of your wives, corrupt ballot boxes as one of your wives, and you have been true to every one of them. [Laughter.] I like your loyalty to them; but do not sneak behind constitutional shields to cover up your purpose; but people know what you are, stick to your women boys, and we will help Idaho to stick to principles and patriots advanced. [Laughter and applause.]
