This is the largest class ever graduated from the college. There are sixteen in all. The graduating exercises will be held at Taylor street M. E. church next Monday evening. Professor Kilbourn will deliver the charge to the class. Mr. Hill will be the valedictorian.—Oregonian.

THE FIRE AT WILLSBURG.

Shindler & Co. Do Not Suffer as Heavy a Loss as Was at First supposed.

The fire at Shindler's furniture factory Tuesday night was not so disastrous as it was feared. The buildings containing the machine and cabinet-making rooms, and the building near, used for varnishing and finishing departments, were burned, but the boilers and engines were not much damaged, and the large warehouse filled with furniture was saved, as well as most of the lumber in the yards.

Mr. D. D. Shindler, superintendent of the works, who resides at Willsburg, was absent for the first time in ten years, looking after some work being done by the company at Seattle.

The men in the factory have been working overtime of late, and did not quit work till 7 P. M. The watchman saw the fire at 10:20 o'clock in the partition between the varnishing department and the finishing room. He blew the whistle to alarm the employees, who, to the number of seventy-five, were soon on hand, and then started the pumps. The buildings are furnished with hose, etc., but the fire spread so rapidly, and the heat was so intense, that but little could be done towards checking the flames. It is supposed that the fire was caused by spontaneous combustion among the rags used in the varnishing room. The loss will be about \$20,000. The insurance on the concern is placed with different companies, and will probably cover the loss. The company will rebuild as soon as possible.—Oregonian.

A Decision of General Interest.

Two years ago John S. Naff made final proof for a tract of land in the Spokane Falls land district. The proof was made before a clerk of court and the papers and \$400 in money, the payment for the land was transmitted to M. G. Barney, receiver, Barney came a default, and was removed while Naff's papers were retained in the office. The assistant commissioner of the land office holds that the receiver was the duly authorized agent of the government. A patent will be issued if the proof is found sufficient and it is said to be the first case in which a patent has been issued before the money was actually paid in to the government.

THE U. P. PRESBYTERY.

Closing of the Session—A Resume of the Business Done Yesterday.

The session of the United Presbyterian Presbytery of Oregon closed yesterday. Statistical reports from the various congregations showed that successful work had been done during the last six months.

Mission work at Tacoma, Washington will be taken up at once, and Rev. W. C. M. Hayes and W. W. Logan were appointed to take the initiative steps. The Ladies Missionary Society of the Presbytery have generously offered \$200 to defray the necessary expenses of the initial work at Tacoma. Rev. A. M. Acheson was appointed to meet with the missions committee, and was instructed to secure men and means to begin work at Spokane Falls, Seattle, Whatcom an Ellensburg, Washington.

Two missionaries were asked for to carry on mission work among the Indians at the Warm Springs reservation.

Application was made to the board of church extension for aid to purchase two lots in East Portland and endorsed by the Presbytery.

The vote on the tobacco overture was changed by the vote of a tardy member. So far as the Oregon Presbytery is concerned the candidate for licensure must quit the use of tobacco.

The next semi-annual meeting of the Presbytery will be held at Oakville, Linn county, the first Tuesday in October, 1890.

Found an Anchor.

Sunday night the British bark Cotsworth made quite a find near Sand Island. While trying to raise her anchor, her chain fouled and on pulling it up was found the two on anchor and sixty fathoms of chain which was lost several months ago by the four masted ship Metropolis. The vessel hauled the anchor aboard, but left the chain as she had no place to put it. The chain was buoyed and is waiting for some one to pick it up.—Astoria Columbian.

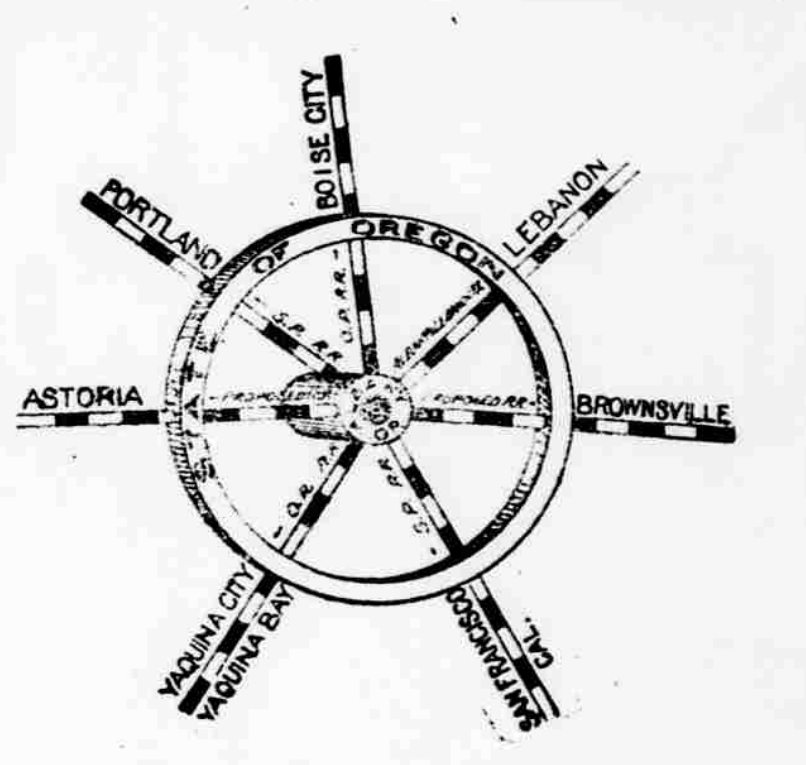
