

ORE IN MOUNTAIN VALLEY.

Specimens Sent to Denver for Assay. A Possible Eldorado. East Oregonian. John S. Gurneane, the pioneer Mountain Valley farmer, is in the city to-day. "Uncle John" is quite enthusiastic over the quartz find recently made up there. The surface led, which begins at the southwest corner of Donald Jones' farm, may be traced for over a quarter of a mile and the ledge is evidently an extensive one. W. W. Miller and S. K. Cox of Hills recently caused an assay to be made of the surface croppings, and the result exceeded their anticipations. Other specimens of ore, obtained at a greater depth, have been sent to Denver for assay, and if the result is favorable, a force of men will be employed in sinking a shaft. Mountain Valleyites are eagerly waiting for returns, and hope that an Eldorado may be discovered in their midst.

CONFERENCE OF LIAISONISTS.

Sending A Fish Pole By Mail.

From The Boston Advertiser. Postoffice officials and employees often have queer articles offered them for transportation through the mails, which at times places them in an embarrassing position. I up in New Hampshire there is one of these little offices at which letters may be registered and money orders obtained, but at which the mail car attached to express trains never stops. The mail bag is hung on a crane beside the track, and the mail clerk, in a room, suitable for a wharf past on the train at forty miles an hour. The other day a man appeared at the postoffice with a joint fish-pole, making a package 45 inches long, which he registered and mailed. It was available under the regulations, full postage and the registration fee had been paid, but what to do with it puzzled the postmaster. It was too long to go in the mail bag. He could not send it in any other than the mail car. He explained his dilemma to the person mailing the pole, but he declined any responsibility. It was in the custody of the U. S. mail and he had nothing further to do with it. Visions of a long journey at his own expense to the nearest stopping place of the mail car, of signaling the train and losing his place for it and of other unpleasant things flitted through his brain. He was surely in a fix. He got out of it finally by driving some miles to the house where lived a railway mail clerk, and giving the bundle into his hands. But this particular postmaster prefers to have no more such mail matter as this, for the present.
