A Good Ticket Placed Before the People of Linn County. The republican county convention met at the court house in this city yesterday.

The convention was called to order at 10 A. M. by Walter Ketchum, chairman of the county central committee.

Hon. S. A. Dawson was elected temporary chairman. F. M. Redfield was elected temporary secretary and Geo. Davis and Peter Hume assistant secretaries.

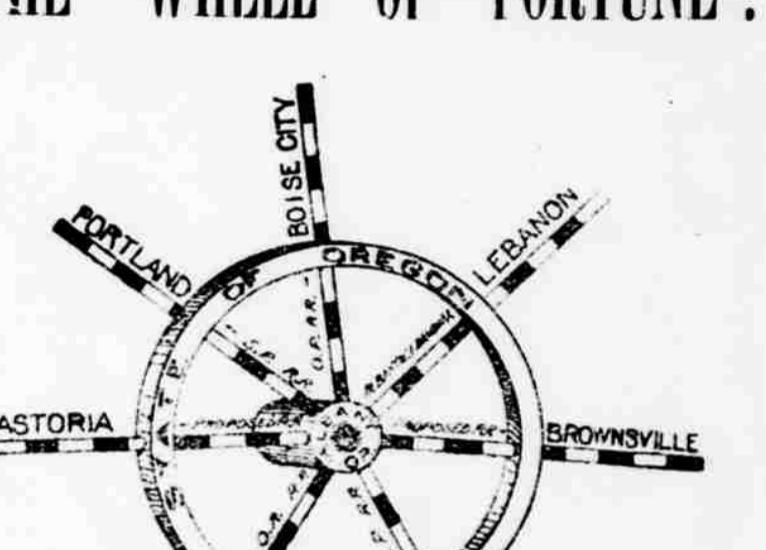
