ON TO BOISE CITY.

Citizens of Boise in Conference With The Oregon Pacific People.

Mr. James A. Pinney, mayor of Boise City, L. F. Carter, ex-senator general, H. Z. Johnson, a prominent attorney, H. B. Eastman and C. W. Moon, capitalists of Boise, were in this city yesterday for the purpose of presenting the matter of the extension of the Oregon Pacific railroad from this city to Boise City to the Oregon Pacific people.

Mr. Pinney had letters of introduction to Mayor Cowan, the editor of the Herald, and other citizens of Albany. The party left yesterday for Corvallis to confer with the managers of the road. One of the party was interviewed by a Herald reporter. He said that the people of Boise City were deeply interested in Albany's prosperity and they wanted connection with the Oregon Pacific road and would work for its immediate extension to an eastern connection at Boise. They expected to be joined at Corvallis by Governor Shoup of Idaho, when they would formally present the matter to the managers of the road.

There is a rich mining, stock and grain district to be opened up by the new road and these men desire to use every effort to secure such connection, in which enterprise leading capitalists there are interested. The exact proposition made to the Oregon Pacific was not made public, but it is understood that the new project has received considerable attention among the Idaho people and will not be displeasing to the Oregon Pacific company.

Should these gentlemen, after their hurried trip, return to Albany they will be tendered the freedom of the city, and accorded a hearty cooperation and assistance of citizens here in the furtherance of their undertaking, as the interests of the two cities are identical, and it is a mutual hope that they will be connected by the Oregon Pacific road in the near future.

Loss of Stock. "We had a terrible winter in Eastern Oregon," said Senator Norval of Union county, yesterday. "In Lake county the loss of stock was 50 per cent, so Senator Cogswell tells me. That was the maximum loss. The loss in Eastern Oregon, as a whole, amounted to 33 1/2 per cent. In Union county the loss was very slight, as the stockmen were well provided with hay. Owing to the late spring everything is backward in Eastern Oregon. A week ago ice formed three-quarters of an inch thick in Union county. The prospect for large crops is fine. Wheat sowing has about finished, but no oats or barley has been sown."

Oregon Coal. G. E. Cannon, a coal prospector for a long time in the employ of the N. P. Railroad Co., was here last Friday. He had just returned from a trip into Coos county, and on his way from the coast, reports an abundance of lignite coal, all the way from the Scottsburg to Drain. The lignite in places is over-layered with a very fine article of canal-wood. He fully confirmed all that has been said formerly of the positive indications of an abundance of bituminous coal at Drain.—Drain Echo.

Two drunken tramps who were riding the brakes on the stock train Wednesday fell off. One was killed outright, and before he was killed the hogs had almost entirely eaten up his body, the other had his leg broken and laid out in the field several hours before he was found. The accident occurred near Talent in Jackson county.—Grants Press Courier.

A Circus On Board. McMahon's circus will come up the river to-day on the steamer Salem. The boat will reach this city about 6 o'clock on its way to Harrisburg, where the circus will give a performance. The elephants it is said have a position on the front deck, being too big to put under cover.

Vagrants Given Employment. Charles Parker and Fred Miller were up before Recorder Henton yesterday charged with vagrancy. The former was given five days in the city jail and the latter three, and both were ordered to be put to work on the streets.

Contest Decided. The Pendleton East Oregonian says that a decision has been rendered in favor of the contestant by the La Grande land office in the contest of Ida Switzer vs. E. S. Farrow, involving a timber-culture near Umatilla.

THE RAILROAD COMMISSION.

They Will Recommend Fixing Their Office at Portland.

Mr. J. P. Faull, of the state railroad commission, on being questioned the other day relative to the work of that body said: "We have a regular monthly meeting, and the May session will chiefly be devoted, I suppose, to the consideration of the claims of Mr. Strickland of Kamela. Mr. Strickland has had some complaint against the Union Pacific, claiming that additional side track-should be furnished him. His first request was that the state railroad commission make an inspection of the situation at Kamela. But this the commission has no provision for. His second, that the commission furnish him and his witnesses transportation to our Salem office; we could not do that. His third proposition was that the commissioners should go to Kamela to hear the testimony of his witnesses there. These propositions were wholly out of keeping with the requirements and provisions of the statutes.

"Our only office, according to the law of the legislature, is at Salem. It is true, provision was also made for an office at Portland, but no funds were appropriated to maintain such an office. "At the next legislature a recommendation will be presented from us, providing for the maintenance of our principal office at Portland. That is the arrangement which should be made. In California the office of the state railroad commission is at San Francisco, not Sacramento. So it should be here.

"What inspections are on the tapis?" "The second or third week in May we shall go over the Union Pacific lines, branch and otherwise. We shall give them plenty of time to furnish us with an engine and car to make the trip."
