## THE DEMOCRATS.

Governor Penney Renominated Without Opposition.

FOR THE JUNE SLAUGHTER.

J. J. Whitney, of Albany, Nominated for Prosecuting Attorney—Beaten for Supreme Judge—A Strong Scam.

PORTLAND, April 21.—The democratic state convention was called to order in Turner hall at 11 o'clock this morning by chairman Bush of the state central committee. The name of P. H. D'Arcy of Carlton was at once placed before the body for temporary chairman, with quite a number of seconds to the nomination.

Ex-governor John Whiteaker was the second nominee for the place. Houston of Washington said in relation to the second nominee, "Whiteaker has always been a representative democrat and there is no man in the party for whom I have a greater admiration, but he has had plenty of honors conferred upon him. D'Arcy is a young man, an active worker, and I desire to see him nominated."

W. R. Blyden of Linn, wanted a man to lead the convention with dignity and strength, and said he knew none of a better quality than him.

There was considerable wrangling at this period, about twelve claiming the floor at one time, and the chair found it impossible to maintain order.

Turner remarked: "I want no gag law application in favor of Whiteaker. I want the question decided by a fair vote. One law won't work in a democratic convention, but the nomination of temporary chairman is an honor Whiteaker deserves."

J. J. Daley of Polk county said: "While I appreciate Whiteaker's talent as a superior lawyer, who has always been an active hard working man in our ranks, and in recognition of his past services I would ask this convention to support him."

Senator Wagner of Multnomah moved that the question should be referred to the ballot. Holman of Multnomah, objected on the ground that such a procedure would be unprecedented, as no committee on credentials had yet reported as to who were entitled to a vote.

Gov. Whiteaker, growing tired of the proceedings, requested his name to be withdrawn, adding: "My name was never submitted at my request, and there shall never be a contest over my name in a democratic convention."

J. F. Miller, of Lake, moved to nominate D'Arcy by acclamation, which was carried.

Temporary Chairman D'Arcy was then introduced to the convention by Chairman Bush.

D'Arcy said: "I salute you with fraternal respect. I am sorry that any contention should have arisen over the temporary chairmanship, but the younger democracy should be recognized. In furtherance of that view I thought that the majority wanted me. I have helped Gov. Whiteaker on several occasions, officially and privately, and he has shown a proper spirit. While I am a young man I have done as much as any one to advance the interests of the democratic party of Oregon."

Now, at the head of our ticket, I am your duty to nominate Governor Penney for re-election, and he is certainly re-elected." [Applause.]

C. J. Frenchard, of Astoria, was elected temporary secretary, and J. H. Miller, of Jackson, and J. H. Miller, of Linn, assistant secretaries. Committees were then appointed as follows: A committee of five on credentials, order of business and permanent organization, and one from each county on platform. An adjournment was then taken until 3 p. m.

elections in Ohio and Rhode Island and says: "We denounce the fraud by which the people of Montana were deprived of their rights of representation in the United States senate by the senator of their choice. We favor tariff for revenue, limited to the expenses of the government, economically administered. We condemn the tariff bill now pending before the house of representatives as an appropriation of the existing duties. We condemn the attempt of the republican congress to reduce the surplus in the treasury by squandering and misappropriating the same, and we specially denounce the attempt to appropriate a surplus of money to the payment of a bounty on sugar. We denounce the action of Speaker Cannon in counting a vote of a democratic representative as void and not voting upon pending measures. We reaffirm the platform of the democratic party, that gold and silver are equally the people's money. We are opposed to all measures of discrimination against silver and demand its free coinage to support the needs of business and its money issued by the government be made legal tender for all debts, both public and private. We direct the attention of the voters of Oregon to the record of the democratic party upon the subject of Chinese immigration and demand the strict enforcement of the Scott exclusion act and the passage of a bill by congress of further vigorous legislation, which will prevent Chinese from entering our territory by evasion of law. We not only favor the forfeiture of the northern Pacific land grant from Wichita to Portland, we also favor the immediate and unconditional forfeiture of all unsurveyed lands to the public domain. We insist that in legislation and administration touching pension affairs regard be had to honorable service and merit. We are opposed to all measures which draw no distinction between the veteran in the field and camp-follower, or the adventurer in the rear, as involving a cruel wrong to the soldier and a wanton waste of the people's money. We urge upon congress the passage of such appropriations and the adoption of such measures as will tend most speedily to the opening of the Columbia and Willamette rivers to free navigation. We favor the adoption of a permanent constitution for the election of senators by direct vote of the people. We unqualifiedly urge the adoption in this state of the Australian system of voting. We approve of declaring eight hours a legal day's work in factories, mines and shops. Gov. Penney was in the last legislature of the Portland water bill was endorsed.

After reading the platform the following nominations were made: R. A. Miller of Jacksonville, was nominated for congress by acclamation.

Gov. Penney was renominated for governor by acclamation.

For secretary of state W. M. Townsend of Lake County, Nathan Pierce of Baker, were placed in nomination. The vote resulted: Townsend, 151; Pierce, 24. Townsend was declared the victor.

G. W. Webb was renominated for state treasurer by acclamation. For supreme judge B. F. Bonham of Salem, was nominated by acclamation.

For superintendent of public instruction Rev. A. Leroy of Brownsville by acclamation. For state printer Capt. J. O'Brien of Portland by acclamation.

## THE DAY IN CONGRESS.

### A VIGOROUS ATTACK ON THE CIVIL SERVICE LAW.

Bill to Provide for Compulsory Education Among the Cured of Malaria—Election Laws.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—In the committee of the whole the house today considered the legislation appropriation bill.

When the clause appropriating the salaries for the civil service commission was reached, Canning of New York, made a point of order that it was not proper to discuss the bill, as the commission was not yet organized.

Among the bills reported from the committee and placed on the calendar was a senate bill to provide for compulsory education for Indian children. The bill was placed on the calendar. It provides that chief supervisors of elections shall be charged with the supervision of congressional elections, with the enforcement of the national election laws, and the prevention of fraud and irregularities in naturalization.

Fugh said that every democratic member of the committee was opposed to the bill, which he said placed republican supervisors over every state officer, thereby insulting and degrading these state officers.

**THE MISSISSIPPI FLOODS.**  
Many People in Imminent Danger of Their Lives.  
BAYOU SARA, La., April 24.—The condition of things in the overflowed district is just coming to light. The entire front of Point Couper is under water. Most of the levees are gone. The water back of the levees is deep and a hundred lives are in jeopardy.

Small stretches of the levees are still standing, and these were crowded with men, women and children, side by side with horses, mules and cows.

In an old elevated gin house 500 negroes are huddled together. The condition of the unfortunate blacks is pitiful. They pitifully beg to be taken to some place of safety.

**RAILROAD MEN WILL STRIKE.**  
Unless Their Demands are Accorded To.  
BOSTON, April 24.—A special force Cheyenne says: A conference has been called to consider the demand of the Union Pacific Railroad trainmen for an increase in wages. Nearly all of the officials are now at Cheyenne. If some solution is not reached to the satisfaction of the men, the Denver, Texas & Fort Worth, Oregon Short Line, Kansas Pacific and the Union Pacific railroads.

**A FIENDISH PARENT.**  
A Crazy Father Drowns His Children in a Barrel.  
SHELTER, Ont., April 24.—This morning a well known farmer named Morrison, after drinking two or three glasses of whisky, took his children in a barrel of water and attempted to drown himself. The neighbors found him lying by the creek in a prostrate condition. His reason is destroyed.

**THE UNION PACIFIC.**  
A Desire to Build from Portland to the Sound.  
NEW YORK, April 24.—The price of Oregon navigation stock went up five points today on the execution of a considerable order to buy from Philadelphia, coming on a narrow supply. At the same time the Oregon Short Line stock was moved up. The real bull points on these stocks is the recommendation to the Union Pacific directors by the engineers and experts to extend their line at once north from Portland to Seattle and Tacoma instead of relying on Northern Pacific connections.

**FATAL EXPLOSION.**  
A Building Wrecked by Dynamite—Two Men Killed.  
DELEVAN, Wis., April 24.—An explosion of dynamite in P. R. Doan's store this evening completely wrecked the building. Four men were in the building at the time of the explosion. Two, P. R. Doan and an unknown man were instantly killed and the two others badly hurt.

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## CALIFORNIA SHAKEN

### The Severest Earthquake Experienced for Many Years.

NEWS THROUGHOUT THE COAST.

A Fatal Murderer His Wife and then Kills Himself—Draw at McMinnville—A Fatal News.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 24.—One of the most severe shocks of an earthquake experienced here for a long time was felt in the city at 11:45 a. m. It was felt in all parts of the city, and in some places it was felt in the hills in places. No serious damage was reported.

**RAILROADS HIT BY PANIC.**  
GILROY, April 24.—The railroad men here have been hit by a panic. There has been a general strike of the men, and the trains are not running. The railroad men are demanding a 10 per cent increase in wages.

**AT PETALUMA.**  
Petaluma, Cal., April 24.—Twenty minutes to four this morning a severe shock was felt in this place. Two or three lighter shocks followed the heavy one.

**MORE DAMAGE DONE.**  
MAYFIELD, Cal., April 24.—An earthquake occurred in this city at 3:37 this morning. Clocks were stopped; plaster was cracked in buildings. The temperature stood at 68 with a heavy atmosphere. Not a breath of air was stirring. Tall trees swayed, making a loud hissing noise. The railroad tracks south of here near Pascadero moved a few inches out of line. The bridge is impassable, both north and south of line, and having settled a few inches. The rails were pulled a foot apart. The ground settled 6 to 12 inches in places.
