POLITICAL POINTERS.

Some Observations Concerning State and County Politics. The state and county tickets of both political parties are now in the field, and the campaign is fairly opened. The third party will cut no figure in the politics of the state this year, and the interest is centered in the two parties, the republicans and the democrats.

The democrats acknowledge that the most of the men placed on the state ticket are only lambs to be slaughtered, as the republicans have put their best men forward and have a large majority in the state. For one or two offices, however, they will make a persistent fight, especially for the governorship. Even the democrats who condemned Penney's cranky notions a few months ago are trying now to work up a little boom for him, but the people of the state have had enough of Penney and they will say so at the polls next June.

In the county politics the campaign has not yet assumed any activity. No speechmaking has yet been arranged for, although the campaign orators will be abroad before the leafy month of June. The republicans of Linn county have put good men forward on the ticket, and as the campaign progresses the Herold may have some reasons to offer why a portion of them, at least, should be elected.

Accidents at Brownsville. On the 21st inst. Carson Kendall, 17-year-old boy, was working for H. R. Moved Their Stock. Wednesday the contractors on the Oregon Pacific moved their stock from the front five miles below Mehama, where there is pasture. Work cannot be commenced for several weeks yet, as there is a considerable amount of snow up in the mountains.

Nearly Drowned in the Canal. A little son of Thomas Hensell, aged about two years, was playing on the bank of the Santiam canal on Seventh street Thursday evening, when it slipped into the stream and was rapidly carried down by the current. The child had drifted down about a block, when Archie Hamner, who happened to be passing, noticed it and sprang into the canal and pulled the little fellow out. He was almost drowned, and had the assistance come a few minutes later there would have been a very sorrowful household in the little boy's home.

Carload of Bananas. A novel shipment passed through Pendleton today, an entire carload of bananas, grown in Cuba. It was made by the G. G. Liebhardt Commission Company, wholesale fruit and produce dealers of Denver, Colo., and was in charge of N. Ryberry. Mr. Ryberry escorted a number of gentlemen to the car, and generously loaded their pockets with the fruit, which was well preserved and truly delicious. MEMORIAL DAY ARRANGEMENTS.

The G. A. R. to Meet General Alger. The Debt on the Hill Paid by the W. R. C. At the regular meeting of the G. A. R. on 5th A. R. last evening, a committee of arrangements for Memorial Day was appointed to act in conjunction with a like committee from the Women's Relief Corps and also from the Sons of Veterans.

The joint committee have been appointed as follows: Post—J. F. Whiting, Rev. I. B. Fisher, S. S. Train, Relief Corps—Mrs. M. J. Train, Mrs. Thos. Hookins, Mrs. R. B. Vank; Sons of Veterans—W. W. Wright, F. O. Beckenridge, P. R. Kelly. The adjutant of the Post was instructed to invite Hon. H. B. Miller of Grant's Pass to deliver the address on Memorial Day.

At the close of the meeting of the Women's Relief Corps asked for admission into the hall, and on being admitted Mrs. Eliza Woodin, president of the corps, in a few well chosen remarks presented to the Post the noble and cancelled mortgage on the hall, amounting to \$234, which the corps had paid at their meeting during the day, from the proceeds of the merchants' carnival, thus relieving the hall from all incumbrance. Several of the members of the Post responded with earnest thanks for the generous action, and a committee consisting of L. H. Montague, S. S. Train and Rev. I. B. Fisher was appointed to draft suitable resolutions of thanks to be entered upon the minutes.

It was decided that the Post go to the train this morning at 6:50 to meet National Commander Alger and wife and Mrs. John A. Logan, who will arrive on the train. Fatal Accident at Grants Pass. Yesterday evening at about 6:30 while the crowd was waiting for the train to arrive, a messenger announced that a man had just been killed near the court house. In a moment many willing hands were at the place, where one of the most horrible sights that ever met their gaze was before them; the body of a man lying stretched out full length, with his head crushed to such an extent that the brains were oozing out and formed large pools. Coroner W. H. Thompson was immediately dispatched for, when he ordered the body to be removed by friends. The murderer was W. W. Wright, who was holding a load of lumber over the crossing at 6 and 8th streets; the front wheels was over when the weight of the lumber, which extended several feet beyond the wagon, found the front end up in the air, throwing Mr. Wright from his high seat, falling in front of the hind wheels, which passed diagonally over his head, with the fatal result as above stated, dying instantly. We believe the only eye witness, L. C. L. One, who stopped the team and gave the alarm—Grant's Pass Courier.

Lots of Brothers. That old woman who was in Albany last week searching for her brother and was picked up drunk on the street is heard from at Eugene this time. She is still in receipt of the long lost brother and mails now from Pittsburg. Of her the Eugene Register says: "A woman giving her name as Persilla Miller arrived in Eugene a few days ago looking for her brother, W. H. Hunter. She is about sixty years old and says she came from Pittsburg, Penn. She says her brother wrote to her that he was living a few miles from Eugene and wanted her to come out. She is now unable to find him and no one here seems to know a man by that name. If there is such a man in this vicinity he should make himself known."
