THE CIVILIZED MODE.

A New York Murderer to Be Killed by Electricity.

THE COUNTRY'S RAILROADS.

The Gold and Silver Wealth of the United States. A Railroad Passenger Train.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 23.—The latest news about a murderer who is still alive, and no one but Warden Dursten knows at what hour or on what day the electrical shock will be sent through his body! Dursten says the execution will certainly not occur during the next twenty-four hours.

It is understood the current used to cause his death will be between 250 and 280 volts, enough to supply about 1000 lights. He made his will to-night. His property consists of a historical Bible, a pig in a clover puzzle, a testament and a slate covered with autographs.

OREGON AND WASHINGTON SHOW AN INCREASED PRODUCTION.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Director of the Mint Leech has submitted to Congress a report on the production of the precious metals of 1889. The gold product of the United States was \$82,600,000 against \$73,600,000 the preceding year. The silver product approximated \$50,000,000 fine ounces at a commercial value of \$9,145,000, and a coinage value of \$9,146,000, and a coinage value of \$43,020,000 and a coinage value of \$9,145,000.

Oregon and Washington both reported increased products, the former having produced \$1,290,000 in gold. Colorado leads with \$24,00,000 in gold and silver.

CRISP WEATHER BULLETIN.

FOLLOWING is the Crop Weather Bulletin of the Oregon weather Bureau, co-operating with U. S. Signal Service, Central Office, Portland, Oregon. For the week ending Saturday April 26th 1890.

Weather.—The temperature has been slightly above the normal for the week. There was no rainfall.

court of Nevada, to day, in the case at Carson City, to forth minutely the history of the reorganization of the Sutro Tunnel Co. through the efforts of T. Sutro of New York, and denies that the Sutro Tunnel Co. syndicate as well as T. Sutro, attempted to defraud any stockholder.

THE STRICKEN SOUTH.

Aid for Thousands in the Over-flowed District.

PROTECTION BY CONGRESS.

The Day's Proceedings at the National Capital—What Dolph's "Inventive" Cost.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—In the Senate to-day there was an extended discussion on the question as to whether the levee system or the outlet or combination was the best fitted to protect the people of the Lower Mississippi valley from the floods. Various opinions were expressed.

Blackburn, who introduced the bill for the admission of Arizona, which was referred to Secretary Proctor, has received several replies to telegrams asking for information in regard to the extent of the suffering in the overflowed districts of the South.

The governor of Louisiana said that ten days' rations for 25,000 should be sent for distribution through that state.

The governor of Mississippi said probably 20,000 in that state need assistance.

The governor of Arkansas said 150 persons in Phillips county and a considerable number in other counties need relief.

IN THE HOUSE.

The house committee on public works to-day decided on a favorable report of the senate bill, with an amendment, providing for the acquisition of land for a town site and for commercial purposes in Alaska. The bill changes the capital from Sitka to Juneau.

The expenses of the Dolph committee were about \$2000. Several correspondents, who were kept under subpoena for 51 days, although only testifying twice, have been paid \$150 each.

Ingalls to-day introduced a bill granting a pension of \$6 a month to all persons who served in the late war for less than three months or more than one year, and \$8 a month to those who served more than a year and not over 800 days, and those who served over 800 days one cent per day for each day of service. No person who is worth \$50,000 or over at the time of the application shall be entitled to this pension.

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
