OREGON RAILROADS.

An Important Report Concerning the Oregon Pacific.

WILL THIS ROAD BE SOLD? Election of Officers of the New Oregonian Railroad Company—Eckleton Is Chief Engineer.

Portland, April 30.—Before C. P. Huntington's departure for San Francisco, the election of officers of the newly organized Oregonian Railroad Co., which has taken hold of the Oregonian Railway Co., was held. The officers elected were as follows: President, T. H. Stillman; vice-president, R. Koehler; secretary, W. W. Brotherton; treasurer, T. H. Andrews; general superintendent, C. N. Scott; chief engineer, A. O. Eckleton.

The outcome of this move, said a railroad man this evening, "will be, I think, the absorption of the Oregon Pacific road, the building of a road up the middle fork of the Willamette, and its extension to a connection with a transcontinental line, which will probably be the North western."

An Important Timber Land Hearing. Assistant Secretary Chandler, sitting with Assistant Attorney-General Shields, in Washington have heard argument of counsel on the appeal of Beach, Evans, et al. The case is the result of the commission of the General Land Office, holding for cancellation certain timber land entries in Humboldt county, Cal., made under the act of March 3, 1878.

While only about 100,000 acres of the timber land entries in Humboldt county are involved, the act of March 3, 1878, permitted the sale of timber lands in California and other Pacific Coast States and Territories, a uniform rule of 100 acres was established for the year 1878 and investigation was begun by the Commissioner of the General Land Office, which revealed the fact as he has stated, that those 700 or 800 entries, containing probably the most valuable timber land in the world, contained about 100,000 acres of timber land, for about 150 of these entries, however, had already been issued.

In his decision holding the remaining entries for cancellation, the Commissioner not only held that the entries were void, but that the present claimants for the land were not innocent purchasers, and the entries were void, and the present claimants for the land were not innocent purchasers.
