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A VISIT FROM THE PRESIDENT.

A Probability That President Harrison May Visit Oregon this Summer.

A movement is on foot in California to have President Harrison visit that state some time during this summer. Of course it would be impossible for the president to visit California without also paying a visit to the most prosperous section of the United States, the Pacific Northwest. The Evening Telegram suggests that it would be a good idea for the people of Oregon to interest themselves in the matter and see that arrangements are made for Mr. Harrison's visit, if he decides to accept the invitation to take place during the Industrial exposition in Portland. This would be the means of increasing upon the president what a great country lies away off here in the Northwest, and he would consequently realize the necessity of pushing all important legislation that we are now endeavoring to pass through congress.

President Harrison would not visit this coast as the head of the republican party, but as the chief magistrate of the American nation consequently he would be hospitably entertained, and given every opportunity to ascertain the needs of the Pacific slope.

A visit of a week or two from President Harrison would be greatly beneficial to the Pacific coast, and Oregon should join California in urging him to come.

Improvements.

Munkers, the first station on the Oregon Pacific railroad east of Albany, is becoming an important shipping point. Freight for Seia is taken at that place. A new site has been laid out and considerable building will be done during the season. The warehouse is busy at present shipping oats, nearly all in the house having been shipped, but a new supply of some 15,000 bushels will be taken in as about that amount has been engaged. The wheat in the warehouse has not yet been drawn heavily upon for shipment.

At the junction of the Oregon Pacific and narrow gauge railroad, Messrs. Shelton & Washburn are putting up a store and blacksmith shop, and have laid out a town site. The change of the narrow gauge into a standard gauge will give their location considerable importance.

To Raise The Three Sisters.

H. I. Hatch, of Salem, has gone to Oregon City with the steamer Bentley, taking with him the timber and ropes and tackle necessary to place the steamer Three Sisters in shape to be launched when the basin is completed, which will be in a week or two. It will be remembered that this craft was landed on the roadway above Oregon City during the high water in February last. She is the property of the Oregon Pacific company and of very light draft, making it easy to tow up the upper river the year round.

Agricultural Bulletin.

A bulletin has just been issued from the agricultural experiment station at Corvallis. In the department of agriculture it gives some valuable notes on farm crops in horticulture, notes on vegetable ornamental trees, shrubs, orchard and small fruit; in chemistry, information on wheat, mineral water, apparatus, soil analysis, etc. These bulletins are sent free to any address, and contain the results of practical experiments.

Mrs. Scott-Siddons.

The famous beauty, Mrs. Scott-Siddons, is expected for an appearance at the opera house Thursday evening, May 8th. Picnic at Mill City.

The Christian church Sunday school at Stayton yesterday had a picnic excursion to Mill City and returned at 3:30 p. m. The train took out two extra coaches, which were loaded with the excursionists at Kings and Lyons, and dropped them at Mill City, where the picnicers enjoyed themselves until late in the afternoon, the train having been accommodated when they returned, voting the occasion a very enjoyable one.

Fourth of July Excursion.

The managers of the Oregon Pacific railroad have made arrangements to run an excursion train from Albany to Breitenbush, or the end of the eastern extension of the track on the 4th of July. The train will leave Albany at about 7:30 in the morning, and start back from Breitenbush at about 4 p. m., giving a very enjoyable excursion.

Public School Picnic.

The children of the public schools, numbering about three hundred, spent part of Friday afternoon in Hackleman's Grove, adjoining this city. Songs, games, recitations, frolic and fun filled two hours very happily. Six weeks yet remain of the current school year. Messrs. THE EVANGELICAL RUPTURE.

Both Factions Holding a Separate Conference. The Breach Permanent.

All overtures toward reconciliation on the part of the two dissident factions of the Evangelical conference have been given up. Both branches held separate meetings yesterday, and the Oregon conference seems to be permanently divided. The breach is not over a principle or any doctrine of faith, but is simply a quarrel over the personal character of some of the bishops. The Evangelical church has a college at Lafayette, and considerable church property in Albany and nearly every other city of Oregon, which will probably be involved in law-suits as a result of the rupture.

The proceedings of both factions yesterday were furnished as follows by the ministers appointed as reporters:

THE BOWMAN FACTION WORK.

After the opening of the conference in the regular order, standing committees reported.

The committee on worship reported as follows, which was adopted.

Sermon at the church: Ordination sermon Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, Bishop Bowman.

Presbyterian church, Sunday evening, N. Shupp.

M. E. church, Sunday evening, Y. E. Stoops.

Christian church, P. Bittner.

The committee appointed to wait on the brethren who left at the opening of the first session, offering conciliatory measures reported that a hearing was not granted.

The following resolutions were passed:

WHEREAS, Statements have been made in the public press in reference to the so-called suspension of our Bishop Thomas Bowman of Chicago, Ill., therefore be it

Resolved, That the Oregon Conference most respectfully request the Bishop on next Monday at 2 p. m. to make a full and detailed statement of the case, leading to the present position in the Evangelical church, and the fact connected with the so-called trial and suspension.

Resolved, That we most respectfully solicit Evangelical members, the public, and the local reports of the press to be present and hear the statement.

Conference then adjourned until Monday at 2 p. m.

THE ANTI-BOWMAN FACTION.

At the second day's session of the Evangelical conference, holding its sessions in the M. E. church South, various committee reports were presented and acted upon.

The board of examiners was chosen, and Lafayette, Oregon, was selected as the place where the next annual conference shall meet.

The following very important resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, We are the duly and legally organized and constituted Oregon Conference of the Evangelical church, and as such, our property, spiritual and temporal, is the property of this conference, therefore be it

Resolved, That no property can be legally conveyed unless it be ordered and sanctioned by this conference, and that the respective boards of trustees of the Evangelical Association in the state of Oregon and the state of Washington, and the public generally, be, and hereby are, apposed thereof and instructed to govern themselves accordingly, as all conveyances otherwise ordered are illegal.

The committee on worship arranged for services for the Sabbath, Rev. W. C. Cantner, president of the Lafayette seminary, Rev. J. B. Rowson, presiding elder, and Rev. J. M. Beck will officiate.

Ordination services will be conducted by Rev. Rowson.

J. M. Beuchamp and H. L. Pratt were voted elder's orders and will be ordained.

A Deserved Compliment.

A Brownsville correspondent of the Lebanon Express says: While in Lebanon Monday we had the pleasure of an introduction to Mr. F. M. Bodfield, republican nominee for county clerk.
