Some of the Northwest states will have from four hundred to five hundred pages each year, and fewer still are aware that those they call California oysters are not natives of the state, but come from Oregon and Washington. This is a fact, however, and another strange fact is that no oysters of any magnitude take naturally in California waters. For many years oyster were only brought from the north. Since the time the railroads came over the mountains, they were imported, and the trade is so large and constantly increasing that Eastern oyster concerns are awakening to the fact that California is a profitable market. - San Francisco Examiner.

Send Empty Cars East.

Emigrants from the east are arriving in Washington so fast that the Northern Pacific railroad finds it necessary to send the empty colonist sleepers back to St. Paul as quickly as possible.
