Washington, May 15 .- The secretary of war has amended paragraph 329 of the army regulations is fellows: The sale or use of ordent spirits or wines in canteens is strictly n ohibited, but the commanding officer may authorize a permit that beer be old therein on week days, wherever he is satisfied that giving to the men an opporunity of getting such beverage within the post limits has the effect of preventing them from resorting to strong drink at places without the limits, and tends to promote temperance and discipline among them. The practice of what is known as "treating" must not be permitted.

THE PRESBYTERIANS.

demarkable Speech by Dr. Reberts at the General Assembly

He B-ye the Presbyterians Must Defend Their Paith With Bloodshed if Neccataly - A Wealthy Church.

SAPATOGA, May 15.-The general assembly of the Presbyterian durches of the United States opened this morning. President Roberts, of Illinois, the retiring moderator, delivered an address on the privileges and consequent obligations of the Presbyterian church. He viewed the work at Temperance Rules Adopted in the length, his absorbing topic being the revision question. He said the hurch has a clear cut, strong and scriptural creed. Notwithstanding the few objectionable passages, the illeged incorrect interpretations of cripture and questionable philososhy of two or three paragraphs in ar standard they are a marvel of skil, and dialectic acumen. The strong truths of our Calvanistic ered are not to be looked on as monstrosities, but as necessary antecedants of a milder and more oveable doctrine. These have been drawn out of God's word in such a way as to forbid the making of any essential change in them without doing violence to the word. Among the other privileges of the church ennmeated and dilated upon were, a government more in teachings of the scriptures then that of any other branch of the church, the championship of the cause of education, the superior necessary appliances and church's conceded wealth.

On this latter point Dr. Roberts said in part. "It may seem doubt-ial at sight whether riches can be regarded as one of the privileges of the church of Christ. In themelves considered they cannot le an indication of moral power cr usefulness. They do acquire, according to the best known principlead ethics, morality, as well as strength, when viewed as a trust
