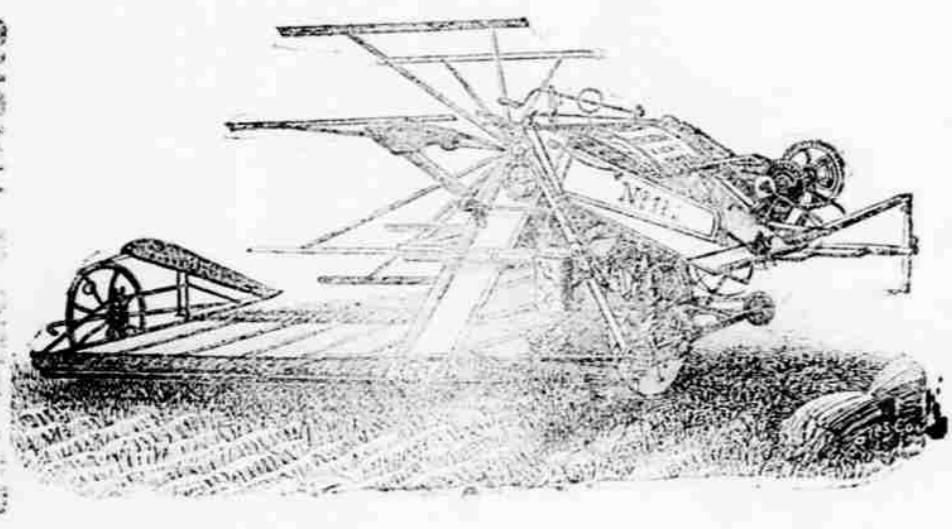

Seized Seal Skins Sold. San Francisco, May 21.—Today U. S. Marshal O. T. Porter, of Sitka, Alaska, sold at auction 2468 seal skins which were seized by the U. S. revenue cutter Rush in Behling sea last year from vessels. Almost the entire lot was bought by the North American Commercial Co. The entire amount realized from the sale was \$21,250.

Election Supervisors. Portland, May 21.—In accordance with a petition presented by ex-U. S. Prosecuting Attorney McArthur, Judge Deady today made an order in the U. S. circuit court that two election supervisors be appointed for each polling place in this city for the coming election.

A FAIR WARNING.

The United States Will Protect Her Sealing Interests. A Negro Ravisher Lynched. Taken From the Court Room and Hanged to a Tree—Fast Time from Portland to Chicago.

Washington, May 21.—Secretary Windom today signed orders for the revenue cutter Bear directing her to at once proceed to Ounalska and thence cruise in the Behling sea to guard against the violation of the statutes on sealing matters. The instructions will not differ materially from last year, but are much more specific. It is understood that according to present orders vessels caught violating the law will be dismantled and deprived of all means of further violation. Their logs and all the skins will also be seized.

Swift Justice. A Negro Ravisher Taken from the Court Room and Hanged. Columbus, Miss., May 21.—While the trial of Frank Anderson, colored, for rape was in progress to-day, a crowd of men took him from the court room and hanged him to a tree.

Shortening the Time. Two Trains Daily on the Northern from Portland. Portland, May 21.—Beginning June 8, the N. P. R. R. will run two through trains daily from Portland to Chicago. There will be a morning and evening service. The time between here and Chicago will be shortened 16 hours.

Big Bank Swindlers. Officers of the Bank America Were Very Dishonest. Philadelphia, May 21.—The meeting of the committee of the creditors of the defunct bank America to-day examined a number of officers of that bank, and secured some startling information. They learned that about \$50,000 was credited to three different men on the books of the bank, who had no money there. The money had been paid out to them and for the American Financial Association and the American Life Insurance Co. by order of President Pfeiffer of the bank.

In Favor of the Republican. Helena, Mt., May 21.—The supreme court to-day decided the Silver Bow county sheriff's contest in favor of Bro. E. Lloyd, republican. The court unanimously held that the vote of precinct number 34 was so irregular in all respects and so saturated with proven fraud that it should be entirely rejected. This elects the sheriff and all republican officers in Silver Bow county.

A Husband's Vengeance. Jessup, May 21.—Last night the proprietor of the Little Field hotel discovered his wife and sheriff McCull in a compromising situation. He drew a revolver and shot both dead.

NOTICE TO WATER CONSUMERS.

The use of water for sprinkling purposes is prohibited except between the hours of 5 and 8 o'clock a. m. and 6 and 9 o'clock p. m. The use of water for sprinkling streets will not be allowed at any time. From and after June 1st to October 1st, part of the water for sprinkling or irrigation purposes will be charged in addition to the regular rate for family use as follows: For each lot or less, \$1 per month. For each additional lot 50 cents. To be paid on the first of each month in advance. Water for building purposes will be furnished on payment in advance on the written estimate of the mason or architect of the brick, stone, plastering or other material for which water is to be used. For material not stated in the estimate application must be renewed. The rate for building purposes will be as follows: Wetting each 1000 brick, 15 cents.
