Narrow Gauge. The Brownsville Times says: When at the depot Wednesday evening we formed the acquaintance of Mr. R. Martin, general roadmaster of the Oregonian Railway company, who was passing up the road, taking a voice of the road on hand. From him we learned that the company has a large number of men at work on the West Side division, repairing and fixing the road up generally.

The company has ordered 200 Chinamen, who are expected to be at Wood County next Monday, and active operation will commence. This road will be immediately converted into a broad gauge line and extended to Springfield. Mr. Penza, of Springfield, went to Portland Wednesday to make arrangements to commence work on the bridge at the former place. It is expected that trains will be running through by the middle of July.

Pacific Coast States. Reports of the bonded debt of the several states have been received at the census office showing the following figures for the Pacific slope, as compared with the census of 1880: California—in 1880, \$5,606,766; in 1890, \$5,320,050. Nevada—in 1880, \$794,098; in 1890, \$651,836. Washington—in 1880, \$75,000; in 1890, \$451,160. Oregon—in 1880, 45 cents; in 1890 \$15,000. In 1880 the gross debt was in California, \$7,212,075; Nevada, \$896,847; Oregon, \$158,006; Washington, \$206,757. In 1890, the figures show: California \$5,808,450; Nevada, \$689,277; Washington, \$1,170,737; Oregon, \$782,015.

The Scott Murder Trial. District Attorney H. H. Hewitt left yesterday for McMinnville, to conduct the prosecution in the Scott murder case. Concerning the trial the Yamhill Reporter contains the following: "The trial of the Scott murder case opens next Tuesday. There will undoubtedly be a strong effort put forth to clear the old man. His attorney talks confidently and refers to evidence that will be presented which will throw light upon many peculiar circumstances. It is not probable, however, that there will be any startling development in the trial, establishing either the guilt or innocence of the prisoner."

A Seemingly Waterloo for the Republicans of Linn.

MEAGRE RETURNS OBTAINED.

Indications that the Democrats Will Walk Off with the Most of the County Offices.

The election yesterday was a very quiet one in this city. There was a determined interest manifested and much scratching was quietly done on both sides.

The union party vote cut little figure in the contest. A heavy vote was polled in Albany, there being 1019 votes cast.

The interest in the state election was intense, and an eager crowd gathered about the HERALD's bulletin board during the afternoon.

The meagre returns obtained from the precincts of Linn county indicate nearly a clean sweep for the democrats. The republicans may elect one representative, and perhaps one or two county offices.

It is probable that Penoyer's majority will equal or exceed at least 300 in the county.

In Albany precinct the count was stopped at 12:45 when half completed, and will be continued this morning. The ballot counted gave Thompson 17 majority.
