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PENNOYER ELECTED.

Thompson Has a Slender Thirty Majority in Multnomah.

AND ONLY 17 IN MARION.

The Contest Thus Far Places Pennoyer's Majority at 4815—All Other Republicans at Office a Elect d.

PORTLAND, June 3.—The returns so far give the republicans 33 members in the house and 22 in the senate. This may be increased by one or two.

In Multnomah county the entire republican ticket is elected. Thompson's majority in this county will be less than 50. A. J. A. gives Hermann, 428; Miller, 396; Thompson, 350; Pennoyer, 328.

SUMMARY OF MAJORITYS.

The semi-official returns giving majorities from the following counties have been received:

PORTLAND, June 3.—The official returns of Multnomah county from all the precincts except seven give the following vote on the state ticket: Hermann, 6735; Miller, 3588; Thompson, 3218; Pennoyer, 3188; McBride, 6830; Townsend, 5481; Metcalf, 6481; Webb, 3638; McElroy, 8260; Leroy, 3578; Bean, 658; Bonham, 3318; Baker, 654; O'Brien, 3538.

The republicans elect the entire county ticket.

JACKSON COUNTY.

JACKSONVILLE, June 3.—From careful estimates the democratic majority on the state ticket will be about as follows: Miller 325; Pennoyer 365; Webb 225; Townsend 200; Leroy 175; O'Brien 225; Bonham 200.

On county ticket the democrats conceded the election to the following republicans: Senator, Canebrake; representatives McCall, Merritt, clerk Muller; sheriff Birdseye; assessor Hamilton.

LATER—seventeen precincts give the results as follows: Miller, 1838; Hermann, 1201; Thompson, 1074; Pennoyer, 1470; McBride, 1028; Townsend, 1307; Metcalf, 1032; Webb, 1235; Bean, 1044; Bonham, 1251; McElroy, 1030; Leroy, 1221. The republican clerk, sheriff and assessor were elected and one representative in doubt.

CLATSOP COUNTY.

EGGERS, June 3.—Fifteen precincts in Lane give Hermann 1192; Miller 985; Thompson 1047; Pennoyer 1079; McBride 1177; Townsend 963; Bean 1251; Bonham 938; Metcalf 1155; Webb 984; Baker 1142; O'Brien 1067; Condon, pro-se, 1187; O'Brien 1067. For state ticket Y. N. P. 018; Venten, 1047. All three republican representatives are probably elected.

LATER—Twenty-four of the 33 precincts of the county give Hermann 1488; Miller, 1306; Judge Bean runs several votes ahead of the ticket. The remainder of the state ticket except governor run about the same as Hermann's vote. The precincts give Thompson, 1329; Pennoyer, 1346. The remaining precincts are reported to give Pennoyer with 100 majority. The democratic candidate for senator was elected. The democratic elect two representatives and the republicans one.

YAMHILL COUNTY.

McMINNVILLE, June 3.—The republican ticket except judge, Thompson's majority will be about 65. The official count gives a majority for Hermann of 303, Thompson 69; McBride 254; Metcalf 274; Bean 277; McElroy 233; Baker 254; Gilliam, district attorney, 240; Smith, joint representative, 277.

MALHEUR COUNTY.

VALE, June 3.—A large vote was polled in Malheur county. The whole republican ticket carried the county by majorities from two votes to 125. This estimate is based on very close calculations. Returns from five precincts give Little, republican, for representative about forty majority. Other precincts will not affect the result. Bonham, republican, for joint senator run behind the vote on the state ticket. The election is close and the result is doubtful. The republicans elect sheriff, superintendent, assessor, and minor officials.

ces. The democrats will probably elect clerk.

POLK COUNTY.

INDEPENDENCE, June 3.—Wm. Wells, (rep.) for sheriff has 301 to M. Burch (dem.) 143. In all other parts of the county, while scratching was general, the vote was quite even; Pennoyer will carry the county by 250 majority. On the legislative ticket N. G. Butler, democrat, will be elected by about 200 majority and Geo. Myer, democrat, by about 50.

Wm. Wells, republican, for sheriff, has received 318 majority in the county.

C. G. Coad 350; W. J. Reynolds, democrat, for superintendent 440 majority; John Simpson is elected by 152 majority.

UNION COUNTY.

UPLAND, June 3.—This county will let a republican legislative ticket. The democrats elect sheriff, clerk and recorder. The republican state ticket has a majority with the exception of governor. Union retains the county seat by 200.

CLATSOP COUNTY.

OREGON CITY, June 3.—Returns for Clatsop county are all in. Twenty-nine precincts counted give Thompson 1527, Pennoyer 1567, Hermann 1718, Miller 1049, McBride 1681, Townsend 1043, Metcalf 1671, Webb 1072, Bonham 1671, Metcalf 1684, LeRoy 1054, Baker 1720, O'Brien 1338, joint senator, Cross 1521, Warren, democrat, 1086, senator, Eastman, republican, 1596, Vaughn, democrat, 937, republican representatives, Paquet 1599, H. H. H. 1575, Francis, 295, representatives, democratic, McGinnis 1074, Toole 1066, Tesse 986.

MARION COUNTY—OFFICIAL.

SALEM, June 3.—The official count in Marion county was completed this evening, but the footings showing the majorities will not be made until to-morrow except on the state ticket, which are as follows: Thompson, 2377; Pennoyer, 2310; majority, 17; McBride, 2083; Townsend, 1746; Bean, 30; Metcalf, 253; Webb, 1918; Walker, 295; McElroy, 2942; Leroy, 1768; Jory, 329; Baker, 2630; O'Brien, 2052; Bean 2671; Bonham, 2521; Whitney 1910. The entire republican ticket except one representative was elected, the majorities ranging from 10 to 3100. Holmes (dem.) for sheriff, is being elected representative by 6 votes.

BAKER COUNTY.

BAKER CITY, June 3.—Pennoyer's majority in Baker county is from 125 to 150; Hermann's is from 150 to 200. Democrats claim entire county ticket with the exception of the county clerk and recorder.

UMATILLA COUNTY.

PENDLETON, June 3.—Pennoyer's majority in this county will be 800. Webb 400 and the rest of the state ticket from 100 to 200. The democrats elect the entire legislative ticket, one senator and three representatives. O'Brien is elected judge of the sixth district by 500 and Hyatt, pro-se, attorney by about 300. The county ticket is democratic by a large majority.

GILLIAM COUNTY.

ARLINGTON, June 3.—Gilliam county returns complete with the exception of two precincts, give the following majorities: Pennoyer 109; Hermann 115; Bean 103; McBride 74; Metcalf 84; McElroy 81; Baker 78; Muller, democrat, 104; Leroy 103; Condon, democrat, the county seat by 106 majority.

BENTON COUNTY.

CORVALLIS, June 3.—Ten precincts out of twenty-one give Pennoyer 224 majority. Indications at present point to the election of the entire republican county and legislative ticket, with possible exception of sheriff, judge and treasurer very close.

CLATSOP COUNTY.

ASTORIA, June 3.—Complete returns from Clatsop county give Hermann 1726; Miller 965; Thompson 1433; Pennoyer 1257; McBride 1732; Townsend 997; Metcalf 688; Webb 1033; Bean 1048; McElroy 698; Baker 1706; Bonham 1047; Leroy 1005; O'Brien 1040; Brockenhorn 919. The entire county ticket is republican, except clerk and sheriff.

THE CENSUS OF 1890

The Dear People Cannot Evade the Objectionable Questions.

A RULING BY CHIEF PORTER.

California Making Elaborate Preparations to Partake in the World's Fair at Chicago.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Census superintendent Porter, today, called the attention of the department of justice to the violation reported to him of two sections of the census law. One imposes a penalty for refusing to answer the census questions; the other a penalty for refusal on the part of enumerators to perform their duties after taking the oath. Up to noon he received information of cases where 25 persons in different parts of the country who refuse to furnish information, and it is Porter's intention to prosecute with vigor all violations of the law reported to him.

BUSTLING CALIFORNIANS.

Arranging for the Big World's Fair at Chicago.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—An adjourned meeting of the world's fair convention was held this afternoon. The committee on organization reported a plan recommending that a general convention be held on Thursday, September 11th next; that each county government be allowed five delegates, and each local organization be given two representatives and each newspaper one. The plan was adopted, as was also a supplementary proposition covering all the commercial and scientific societies, patrons of husbandry and other societies. It was decided to hold the convention in San Francisco. The report of the sub-committee recommending the immediate incorporation of the world's fair association was adopted. The mayor was instructed to appoint a committee of eleven on organization.

A FAVORABLE REPORT.

On Bills Before Congress for Pacific Coast Improvements.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The senate bill establishing ports of delivery in Alaska, and for the construction of a steam vessel for use in Puget sound, also the house bill authorizing the construction of a bridge over the Columbia river were favorably reported to the house today.

The Kemmer Case.

BUFFALO, June 3.—In the general term of the supreme court today the decision of Justice Underwood in Auburn, in the Kemmer habeas corpus case was affirmed. This allows the case to go to the court of appeals. The only question is whether Kemmer can be legally executed by electricity by the warden of Auburn prison.

Pennsylvania Politics.

PITTSBURGH, June 3.—Hon. Thos. M. Bayne, congressman of the 23rd district, closed his nomination today. Col. Wm. A. Stone, ex-U. S. district attorney, was nominated for the 2nd district. Hon. John Bozell was also re-nominated.

He Ought to Have Resigned.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—John S. Bell, chief of the secret service, having failed to comply with the request for his resignation, has been dismissed. His successor has not yet been selected.

Wedding in High Life.

NEW YORK, June 3.—Miss Grace Oakley, daughter of T. F. Oakley, president of the Northern Pacific railroad, and Frederick Brooks of Boston, were married today at the country house of Henry Villard at Dobbs Ferry.

C. S. Gumbo Launched.

CHESTER, Pa., June 3.—The U. S. gunboat Bennington was launched at the Korch ship yard at noon today.

Theresa Fair Married.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—Hermann Olmick of New York and Miss Theresa Fair, daughter of ex-Senator Jas. G. Fair, were married this evening at the home of the bride's mother in this city. The ceremony was solemnized according to the rites of the Roman Catholic church, Arch-bishop Riordan officiating.

Victoria News.

VICTORIA, June 3.—The cannoners of the north will not start to run before June 15. A large strike of silver ore has been made at Bella Colode.

The Duke Pardoned.

PARIS, June 3.—President Carnot has granted a pardon to the Duke of Orleans, who was sent to prison in February last for violating the decree of exile issued against members of his family.

The Tacoma's Win.

TACOMA, June 3.—Tacoma six; Spokane five; twelve innings.

The Engineer in Hiding.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 3.—Sheriff Hale, of Alameda county, and several deputies have been keeping up search for Engineer Dunn in order to serve a warrant charging

him with manslaughter, which was issued by the coroner of Oakland, after the inquest into the cause of the draw bridge disaster last Friday.

Efforts to locate Dunn have been futile. Sheriff Hale has sent messages to all parts of the state asking for the arrest of Dunn.

The Beecher Charges.

SEATTLE, June 3.—In the United States district court to day Judge Hanford refused to dismiss the celebrated cases against ex-Special Custom Agent Beecher of Port Townsend.

A Portland Citizen Dead.

PORTLAND, June 3.—Dr. R. E. Gilman, a well-known citizen, died of apoplexy this afternoon at his residence in this city.

The Scott Trial.

McMINNVILLE, June 3.—The trial of Wm. Scott, the murderer of his wife in February, was begun at one o'clock today.

THE FIRST BOWIE KNIFE.

It Was Whittled Out of a Shingle by a Texas Prospector.

John Sewell, the grandfather of the writer, says the Galveston News, came to Texas with DeWitt's colony, and being a gunsmith and blacksmith set up a shop at Gonzales and was operating there in 1830. At this time James Bowie was in Texas prospecting for gold and silver in the mountains west of and northwest of San Antonio, and often had desperate encounters with the hostile Indians who infested these regions. In one of these conflicts Bowie stabbed an Indian, and the knife blade glancing against a rib Bowie's hand slipped forward, inflicting a wound upon himself in the hand. This accident, I have been told, suggested the idea of a guard to keep the hand from slipping forward upon the blade in making a hard thrust. There were a great many cypress trees along the margin of the Guadalupe river, and the pioneers in the colonies often established shingle camps along the river to work this timber up.

On one occasion, as Bowie and his men were returning from a trip, they stopped at one of these shingle camps to rest and recruit their horses, and while doing so Bowie whittled from a shingle a pattern of the knife now in question. It is amusing at this day to see some of the things now called Bowie knives. On arriving at Gonzales he went to my grandfather's shop—the only place then in West Texas where iron and steel were worked—and asked him whether he could make one like it out of steel. The blacksmith at once went to work and soon produced an exact counterpart of the pattern, which was in every way satisfactory to Colonel Bowie. On presenting the knife to my grandfather he asked Bowie if he might give it a name, as it was a peculiar knife. Being answered in the affirmative, he said: "Well, I will call it the Bowie knife."

A New Strike.

Baker City, Idaho. Word came in from the Dolly Varden mine yesterday to the effect that Thomas White had just made a new and rich discovery in Paddy's Paradise. While out mining in the locality named, Mr. White found a ledge from which he struck out a piece of ore which showed a streak of ore that carried a dollar to the ton. It has been uncovered to the depth of ten feet, and improves in quality as the depth is obtained. Some wonderfully rich placer ground has been worked in Paddy's Paradise in former years, and it is believed those who have seen the whole strike estimate that the whole ledge will average \$15 free gold to the ton, exclusive of the high grade streak.

Is Electricity Manufactured.

New York Sun. The question whether or not electricity is manufactured or not being tried in certain courts. It is manufactured, the producers in numerous states are liable for taxation. Benjamin Franklin held that electricity was not manufactured, but was taken from one body to be delivered to another, and that practically nothing was lost in the transition. Hitherto our scientific men have held this to be true in a broad sense.

Matthew Fountain, a farmer of Losie Pine, Whitman county, lost his dwelling by fire, which was valued at \$1500; no insurance.

An infant child of Mr. Fountain narrowly escaped perishing in the flames. The fire was first discovered by his little girl. The babe was asleep in the house at the time. Instead of going to save the little one, the girl ran to tell her father, who was at work some distance away in the field. It was only by the greatest exertion that he reached the house in time to save his child, asleep, in ignorance of its peril. The child with the picture of his wife, sometime since deceased, was all he could save, and he considered himself fortunate in saving his child.

STORM IN THE EAST.

Houses Blown to Pieces and Several People Killed.

MATTERS BEFORE CONGRESS

Some Sensational Disclosures in an Election Contest—A Wedding in High Life.

COUNCIL BLUFFS, June 3.—The Nonpareil Glenwood special says: One of the most disastrous storms that ever visited this section struck here early this morning. The state institution for the feeble-minded was blown down. The roof of the building was crushed by a falling smoke-stack, which tore its way through the building, killing two inmates. Six others were seriously hurt.

THE STORM IN OHIO.

MANSFIELD, June 3.—This afternoon during a heavy storm lightning struck Tracy & Avery's power house, containing over 5000 pounds of powder, which exploded, causing a tremendous report. Hundreds of windows in the city were broken; gasware was knocked from shelves and people were thrown from their feet. Many buildings in this vicinity were badly wrecked. A dwelling, occupied by Henry Root, his wife and two children, was destroyed. A six-month-old babe was instantly killed. Its mother and another child are thought to be fatally hurt.

SENSATIONAL DISCLOSURES.

Glaring Election Frauds Exposed in South Carolina.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The majority report in the case of Miller vs. Elliott, from the seventh South Carolina district, was submitted to the house committee on elections today. The report is somewhat sensational in that it declares the entire South Carolina registration and election law unconstitutional. The basis for this declaration is that the state law imposes a number of restrictions upon the exercise of the right of suffrage which are in conflict with the state constitution.

The report also says a number of negroes have been compelled by poverty, while awaiting the maturing of their cotton crop, to negotiate their registration certificates to raiders who immediately sent them to political headquarters with the result that the negroes are permanently disfranchised.

The report recites the fact that in certain precincts the ballot boxes were separated in the case of each office and voters were deceived by the intentional shift of the boxes so that the judges of election were able to throw out all of the ballot cast in the wrong boxes.

Summing up it is found that taking the position most favorable to the settling members, contestant Miller had a majority of 755, while the law is strictly followed, his majority will reach 1445.

Winning of Missouri, will prepare a minority report.

SMUGGLING CHINESE.

How They are Sprinkled Across the Border by the Score.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—A. Willard, U. S. Consul at Guaymas, Mexico, in a letter transmitted to the senate to day, reports the arrival of one hundred and eleven mongolian Chinese at Matatlan. Thirty-nine Chinese, whose arrival at Guaymas was reported in a previous letter, Willard says, have left Guaymas for towns in Sonora near the United States frontier, and are awaiting a chance to cross the border.

The United States officers were notified. Levi W. Myers, United States consul at Victoria, B. C., tells how 22 Chinese were undoubtedly smuggled into the United States by the steamer North Star. The Chinese were taken on board the vessel at night, and the Canadian collector had no watching her, she slipped out of the harbor in safety and managed to elude pursuit. A tug was sent after her.

The price charged for this work is \$20 per head. Myers says, "If this practice is not stopped, our cutters must be placed on the Sound and spied must be employed to aid the Canadian authorities."
