A TOWN IN RUINS.

Bradshaw, Nebraska, Destroyed by a Tornado.

MANY KILLED AND WOUNDED.

Iowa Towns Submerged by a Destructive Cloud-Burst—Great Destruction to Property.

LINCOLN, June 4.—The State Journal party returned from the scene of the tornado in Bradshaw this evening, and brought confirmation of the worst reports received from there. The storm took the town at 8:30 Tuesday evening. The roar of the wind was the first notice the people had of the disaster. Not a single building is left. Every business house was made a total wreck, and the principal street is filled with ruins.

THE SILVER QUESTION.

McKinley Comes to the Front With a Compromise Measure.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The republican caucus immediately on the adjournment of the house this afternoon to consider the silver question. It had been announced in advance by the leaders that the real purpose was a conference on the silver question. Representative Buchanan submitted a motion that the caucus be adjourned until the next day. Representative Walker submitted a proposition which in effect proposed the reference of the bill to the former caucus committee, with instructions to report a bill which will place gold and silver at par by allowing the issue of certificates to an unlimited extent on deposits of either metal at the market value.

THE LONDON DERBY.

British Aristocrats Lose \$100,000 in the Great Race.

LONDON, June 4.—The great race for the Derby stakes for three year old colts and fillies, distance a mile and a half, was won to-day by Sanjour. There were eight starters. TIDE LANDS DECISION.

In his decision the secretary says the motion for a review is not a new case, and the fact of point of law not discussed or involved in the decision of March 27.

Important Amendments to the Tariff Bill.

OREGON MEMBERS AT WORK.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Senator Sherman to-day proposed and had referred to the finance committee an amendment to the tariff bill the wool schedule prepared by the national wool growers' association. Senator Wadsworth also proposed to amend the bill by putting white pine timber on the free list.

INDIAN OUTRAGES.

A Number of People Murdered by the Reds in Arizona.

TUCSON, June 4.—Three Mexicans have just come in, saying that they were driven into this city by Indians, who attacked them nine miles from here, near San Miguel mine. They secreted themselves in the rocks and escaped. A Mexican brought word here to-day of the killing of a man, his wife and two children about five miles from Patoms yesterday. He reports going to the ranch and finding the family murdered and the house burned.
