Barn Burned. The Salem Journal says J. W. Gilbert, who lives on the old stage road, about five miles north of this city, had a large barn destroyed by fire Monday. The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed to be the work of some incendiary. In addition to the barn about fifteen tons of hay, a self-binder and eight hogs were burned. At the time of the fire a stormy breeze was blowing from the southwest, which prevented the fire house of Mr. Gilbert from being destroyed. The fire attracted many of the neighbors, but their efforts were of no avail, as it had too much the start. Mr. Gilbert's loss will be about \$1500. As far as could be ascertained there was no insurance on the building.

Fire at Chenawa. Monday night the frame cottage of F. J. Beatty at Chenawa was burned to the ground. It was a new house, having recently been constructed and occupied. Mrs. Beatty was away from home at the time and Mr. Beatty was in Salem. The house stood within less than a mile of the barn of J. W. Gilbert that was destroyed by fire on Monday, and was just across the road from the Chenawa Indian school grounds on the north. It was insured in the State Insurance company of Salem for \$1200-\$1000 on house and \$200 on contents. The cost of the cottage was estimated at about \$1500. It was a story and a half building.

A Pertinent Query. ALBANY COLLEGE COMMENCEMENT

The Exercises for the Present Year Will Occur on June 8, 9, 10 and 11.

The Albany College Commencement exercises are announced for June 8th to 11th. There will be a union service at the opera house on Sabbath next, both morning and evening. Rev. Dr. Campbell of Astoria will preach the annual sermon in the morning and address the young people in the evening.

All are cordially invited to join in these services. On Monday evening the 9th inst. will occur the undergraduate entertainment. Mrs. O. S. Pollock has charge of this work, and has the students in good training for the occasion. The entertainment will be of a high class and promise to reflect credit on the college. Moore's Paradise and the Peri together with a spectacular drama will constitute the chief features.

The vocal music is in charge of Prof. W. H. Lee and will be rendered with good chorus effect. Prof. Lortian's pupils in instrumental music will present several pieces of classical music. Under his skillful instruction his classes have made rapid progress. This entertainment is the only commencement exercise to which an admission is charged. The proceeds go to defray the necessary expense on this annual occasion.

On Tuesday evening a free lecture will be given at the opera house by the Rev. S. M. Campbell D. D. who has a reputation of being a very forcible and eloquent speaker.

Mr. Lewis Earle Lee graduates this year from the Preparatory Classical course. He expects to enter an eastern college in the fall. On the commencement stage on Wednesday morning Mr. Lee will be supported by two Junior Orators. One by Miss Rose Trumbull and the other by Mr. Carlton Sox.

These graduating exercises will be held at the opera house on Wednesday the 11th at 10:30 o'clock a. m.

THE ELECTION

The Official Count Required to Decide the County Surveyorship.

The returns have been received from all the precincts in Linn county, and the official vote will probably be canvassed to-day.

The totals as shown in the appended table do not differ materially from the returns already published, except that for county surveyor there is a tie, the vote of E. J. O'Connor and E. T. Fisher standing 1940 each. Pennoyer's majority is 576. The other democratic officers receive majorities from 200 to 300. Some of the figures are not absolutely accurate and will be changed some by the official count, but the result will not be changed. For

surveyor unless an error can be found one way or the other there will be a tie, in which event the two candidates will decide by lot, according to law, which one shall hold the office.

Large Cattle Shipment. Two train loads of 35 cars of cattle, equal to 560 head passed through Albany from California for Victoria this week. When the Oregon Pacific railroad gets into Crook, Grant and Harney counties, they can avail themselves of the 50% price of beef early in the summer, without having to drive on foot to the Columbia river.

The state has just received \$17,205.21, being the annual apportionment of 5 per cent on sales of United States land in the state.

BOYS IN BLUE

A Detachment of Cavalry and Six Car Loads of Horses Stop in This City.

A train of six car loads of cavalry horses and a detachment of soldiers, under command of Lieutenant Brainard of the Second Cavalry, arrived in this city yesterday from Fort Bidwell, California, on their way to Vancouver. They stopped off at this city to rest and graze their horses for a day, and will go on to-day.

The boys in blue were given the freedom of the city, so to speak, and the horses were placed upon the farm of Mr. James Elkins in the southern suburbs of the city. They marched 200 miles from Fort Bidwell to Reno, Nevada, and were then shipped by rail for their destination at Vancouver.
