AN INDIAN HANGED.

Pellio Meets Death on the Scaffold Protesting His Innocence.

MULTNOMAH'S OFFICIAL VOTE.

PORTLAND, June 6.—Pellio, the Indian condemned of the murder of a woman on the Umatilla reservation and condemned January 30th, was hanged here today by the federal authorities, assisted by the county officials, in the woods at the corner of his spot.

He spoke for about ten minutes in Chinook, which was interpreted by Deputy Sheriff Milner.

He spoke in a firm tone of voice, saying that God knew he was innocent; that he did not kill the woman and God knew he spoke the truth.

For about five minutes he repeated that he was not a bad man and was innocent of the murder.
