The Salem Statesman says that the committee for Salem's Fourth of July celebration want to secure the attendance of the national guards at Salem on the Fourth. They want to celebrate in 1888 and Albany in 1889, at both of which places they added very much to the attraction of the celebration, constituting the better part of the parade. The six companies of the Second Regiment—Albany—Crosby, Whiteaker, Melcher, Eugene, and Salem—can be secured for that day for about \$500, and it is the opinion of the Statesman that no more pleasing attraction could be obtained for the same outlay. They would not only form a very interesting part of the parade, but would, in the afternoon, engage in a sham battle that would in itself be a great drawing card.

From the South.

George O. Piper of Seattle is in the city. Mr. Piper, his brother, E. B. Piper and L. V. Lonsbury, formerly of Albany, have organized a real estate company, and are the authorized agents of the Gray's Harbor Townsite Syndicate, who have invested heavily at that place. The Gray's Harbor people gave a subsidy of \$200,000 to secure the terminal advantages of the Hunt railroad system, and the place is taking on a wonderful growth. It is a fact that there is more good timber tributary to Gray's Harbor than to Puget Sound, and it will not surprise well informed people to see a big city grow up there. E. B. Piper is editor and proprietor of the Grays Harbor Times, just started there with flattering prospects of success.

Fire at Scio.

About 8 o'clock yesterday morning fire was discovered in the barber shop of Frank Mack at Scio and the fixtures and entire inside was burned out. The damage was about \$300. The fire was supposed to be the work of an incendiary. A quantity of kerosene and shavings were found strewn about the building and there is little doubt but that a fire bug has been operating at Scio. Janeway, of Newberg, a United States prisoner, sentenced from Portland for a one year term for robbing the mail; C. E. Jones, from Portland, under six indictments for larceny, for six years; Wm. Franks, from Portland, five years for larceny; and W. C. Webb, from Portland, June 6th, '89 for three years for larceny. The sentence of the last named was commuted by Governor Penney upon the recommendation of the jury and district attorney.

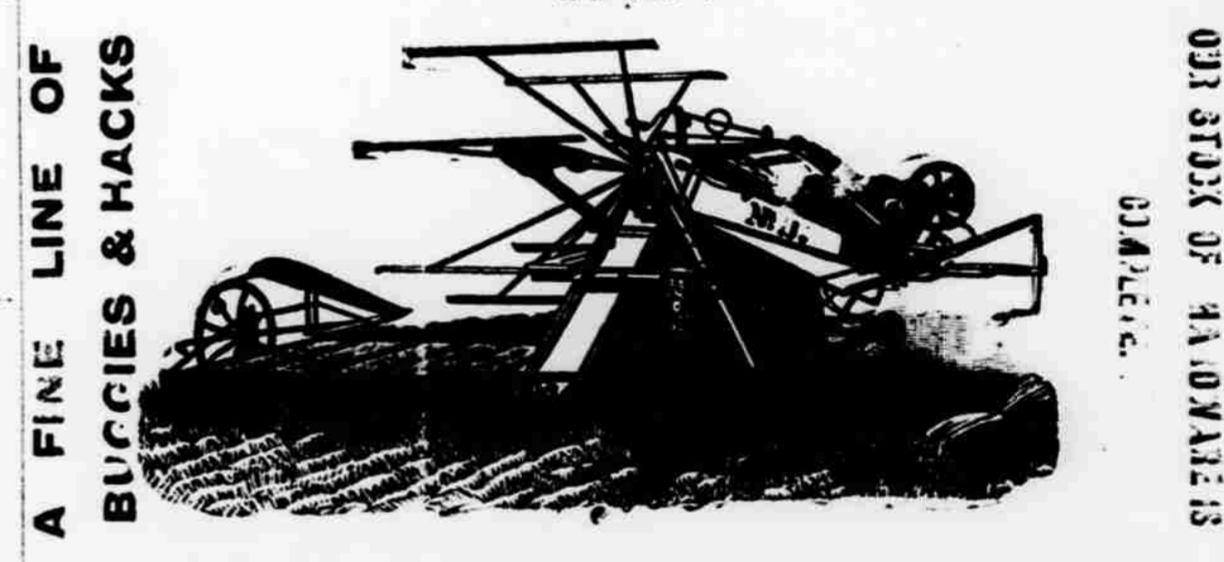
