JACKSON COUNTY'S SHEEP.

Captain W. F. Songer, county stock inspector, has finished his annual spring round and reports to the Ashland "Tidings" that he finds the condition of the sheep better generally than he anticipated, in view of the unusually severe winter upon stock. Mr. Songer reports that the sheep in the county number now 15,798, whereas last fall there were 25,212 reported in the county. This shows a very heavy winter loss—almost 50 per cent. Mr. Songer reports 10,618 sound sheep and 3,180 average more or less sound among these. The number of lambs this spring is given at 5,197.

Mrs. Colonel Hodges.

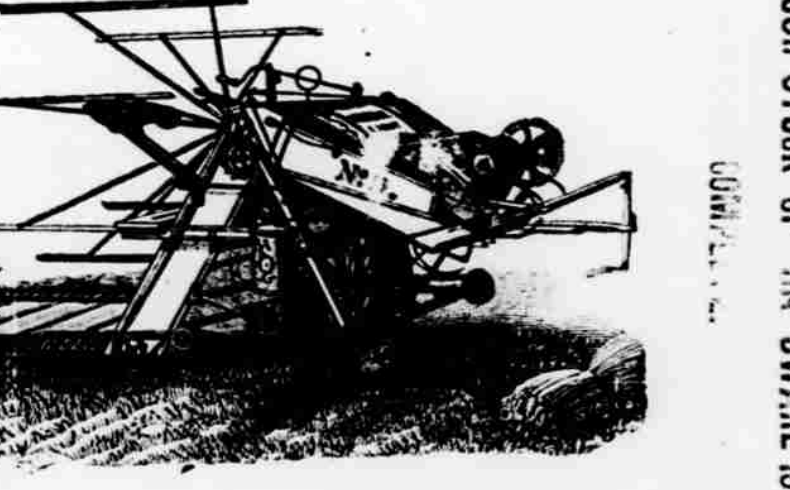
