Violating the Fire Limits. J. C. Agnew, a fish dealer of this city, was arrested yesterday for violating the fire ordinance forbidding the erection of wooden buildings within the fire limits. Suicide in Salem. Charles Stokes, a hostler and buggy-washer, employed at Ellis & Whitley's livery stable, in Salem, was found dead in his room at the Cienfuegos hotel Monday evening, and the supposition is that his death was caused by suicide. He had been drinking for several days, and after being discharged, talked as if he had in contemplation self-destruction. He was asleep in the room with the door locked all day long, and the landlord sent the porter over the door to see what was the matter. Stokes was in a crouching position at the side of the bed, dead, the body was still warm. He was aged about 45, and had been in Salem three weeks, coming from McMinnville or Stillmore. The general supposition is that death resulted from poison of some kind taken by Stokes.

LETTER FROM IDAHO.

The Country to Which the Oregon Pacific Railway is Building.

Caldwell, June 9. Perhaps a few lines from this portion of the hemisphere would be of interest to your readers. Caldwell is situated on the Oregon short line about twenty miles from Boise City and is a flourishing little place of perhaps seven hundred population, not counting the squatters, which are quite numerous.

The business houses are mostly small and with modern improvements in the interior. The city is incorporated. There are four general merchandise stores, three drug stores, four saloons, three restaurants and two hotels with the other necessary adjuncts. There are well regulated city. There are a good number of schools, and a school house where the young folks learn a tongue to shoot, and they shoot quite often. I am told they have a cooler and neither beer nor drinks are allowed to roam the streets at will. There are two large irrigating ditches being taken out of Boise river this summer.

The Phyllis canal or ditch is almost completed. The New York ditch is the larger of the two which will be sixty feet wide at the top and forty feet wide at the bottom with an average depth of ten feet. The ditches will cover an area of about 100,000 acres, and in the absence of water, in ordinary seasons I fear there will be no water left for the farmers along the lower Boise which will be sure to cause trouble all around.

There are hundreds of thousands of acres of good land along Snake River, if it only had water, but like the Ancient Egyptian "water everywhere and not a drop to drink" there is an abundance of water in Snake river but it is unavailable on account of the very small fall in the river. The names are bearing this year, among the more noted ones being the seven Devils, Mineral City and Dr. Lamar. A standstill will ply the waters of Snake river between Huntington and the Seven Devils, where there will be a large number of cities this summer.

There is talk of a large mill near Mineral City while large works are already in course of construction at Dekamar where the pay roll is said to be twenty-four thousand dollars monthly.

The vineyards of Western Idaho resemble to Eastern Oregon from which they were divided by Snake river. I went along Snake river and along the Boise, Payette and Weiser rivers, is very productive there water can be had and there is not too much alkali.

There is considerable fruit raised in the Boise valley but a great deal of it is not marketed. I qualify the past season on account of some, on Lanna Creek about thirty miles from Weiser I say I saw a fine peach last summer is any one would wish to see. But they only have a good crop once in three years.

There is also a fine crop of apples, but I am afraid horticulturists will have more pests to deal with here than they do in all the rest. I have noted a species of parasitic scale here that I never saw before. So far I have noted it on prunes and box elder trees.

The atmosphere is very conducive to the rapid propagation of new life, being very dry and very hot in summer.

Small fruit has not been injured in very extensively, yet I think it will do fairly well. What few patches have come under my observation have not been injured by hedges, consequently they were not fairly representative samples of what can be done.

Most kinds of grain do well. Wheat yields from thirty to fifty bushels per acre, yet the people of Idaho do not raise their own flour, but are dependent on Oregon and elsewhere for the bulk of their flour.

They show the same enterprise in regard to improving their stock, only in the Boise valley have I seen any efforts made to raise their hogs above the cayuse standard, except in one or two instances. They have a few good cattle along here, too.

The new farms show a laudable ambition in importing from the east cast-iron stoves, and the best quality of book-keepers, for it seems they can't find native Idahoans with brains enough to run their business, and haven't brains enough to save themselves, or any amount they will have to landage their heads if they put their own to work. There's a screw loose somewhere, for they send off to Nebraska, Iowa or some place for most of their stove help, when it seems to me they should give one talent the preference.

The state, less the past winter was very heavy, in some places reaching seventy-five per cent, or even higher. The snowfall was quite deep, notably in the upper Weiser valleys and in Long valley, the snowfall in southern valley was not feet, four of which were on a ground at once and stayed there six weeks; while the reported snowfall in Long valley was seven feet on the ground at one time, but the deep snow in the mountains and high valleys is the mark of the lower valleys.

Oregon Postal Facilities.

The postoffice department has just decided on a new method of dealing with postal changes in the West. Assistant superintendent of the railway mail service, Scotland, has been sent to the Pacific coast to investigate as to the needs of several states and the territories, with headquarters for the present in Portland, Or. Mr. Scotland will have general supervision of the mail routes in Northern California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Nevada, the Dakota and the territories. He is looking for improvements and extensions of the mail service. The department having declared the initiative did not wait for complaints, whenever complaints or requests for increased service are made he has instructions to make his recommendations as soon as he can investigate, thereby saving some weeks' delay in forwarding the documents to the postoffice at three times the ordinary rate.
