FIRE IN SEATTLE. A Disastrous Blaze Sweeps the City's Water Front. THE LOSS IS OVER \$100,000.

SEATTLE, July 1.—At 8:15 to-night a fire broke out in a row of two-story apartment buildings on the west side of West street between Columbia and Marion streets on the water front.

The fire was caused in some unknown way in Stewart's commission house in the second story on the corner of Main street.

The flames spread rapidly, in some places reaching a height of 100 feet.

At 9:45 they succeeded in doing this. The fire department also placed an engine on the water and threw two strong streams of salt water into the heart of the fire.
