A Move to Erect a Magnificent Structure on Second Street This Summer.

A company is being formed in this city for the erection of a big hotel on the corner of Second and Broadalbin streets. It is to be 100x100 feet and four stories high. The company has filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state, and the shares of stock are being rapidly taken.

The capital stock of the company is \$50,000, divided into 500 shares. The incorporators are: Charles Pfeiffer, L. Flinn, S. E. Young, J. L. Cowan, G. W. Maston, E. F. Sox, R. S. Strahan, Jay W. Blain and Charles E. Walker.

It is the intention of the company as soon as the capital stock is subscribed, to effect a permanent organization and commence the erection of the building, the completion of which will probably occur next year. It will be the finest structure in the city. The plans are now being drawn by the architect, Mr. C. W. Ayers.

The hotel will be an assured fact if those directly interested come forward with subscriptions of stock as they should do.

STATE TEACHER'S ASSOCIATION.

Annual Gathering of the Pedagogues At The Capital.

The annual meeting of the State Teacher's Association has been in session at Salem this week.

On Monday afternoon the county superintendent of the State held a meeting and in the evening the session continued.

Prof. Starr delivered an address of welcome and the reply was given by Prof. P. L. Campbell of the State Normal school.

Officers elected were Chairman A. W. Jarvis of Unadilla county, Vice President, D. W. Yoder, of Marion county, Secretary J. B. Horner of Roseburg.

Rev. C. E. Eaton of Mt. Tabor and C. E. Eaton of Ohio were among the prominent speakers present.

The exercises were full and interesting, and were taken up by the teachers from all over the state, the attendance being large, at the present time.

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NORTHWEST NOTES.

The Yamhill county fair will be held at McMinnville on September 2, 3, 4 and 5.

The hay and grain crops along the valley of the Willamette looking well at present, the crop is estimated to be about 100,000 tons and stock sheep from Grant and Moorock counties will be shipped or driven through and distributed over the states of Dakota, Nebraska and Kansas during the present season.

An accident occurred at the Kings Valley sawmill last Friday, which resulted in the death of one of the hands. A log was being turned in the mill, when some of the machinery gave away and the log falling on Mr. O'Brien, killing him instantly.

The marked effect of recent rains may be seen upon all growing vegetation. The fall and early sown will attain a higher stand and the late sown oats and wheat will at least make a good hay. Apples and pears are a most promising crop.

The indications are that the hop crop this year will be an excellent one and above the average. The recent rains and cloudy weather have promoted the growth of the vine. The grower may also be congratulated on the prospect for securing a remunerative price for his hops.
