CITY COUNCIL

Contract Let for the Extension of Calapooia Street Sewer—Telephone Facilitate Granted.

The city council met last evening in regular session, the mayor and city officers being present.

Petition of Thos. Briak for sewer privilege; grants and work ordered done within 30 days.

The reports of the city recorder and treasurer were read and referred to the committee on finance.

Petition of citizens for a sewer to be constructed from the east line of Washington street, through blocks 67 and 68 and across Ferry street to connect with the main sewer on Broadalbin street; referred to the committee on health and police.

Petition of citizens for an arc electric light at the junction of Eighth and Washington street; referred to committee on ways and means.

An ordinance to establish the grade on Tenth, Eleventh and Twelfth streets, east of Vine street to the east side of Ellsworth street in Albany was read and referred to the committee on ordinances.

The street commissioner recommended the following improvements: A new sidewalk on the south side of First street, adjoining block 10; a new sidewalk on the north side of Second street, adjoining block 8; new sidewalk on the south side of Seventh street, adjoining lot 4, block 56; and a new sidewalk on the west side of Calapooia street adjoining lot 4, block 59; referred to committee on streets and public property.

An ordinance granting the Sun set Telephone and Telegraph Co. the right to erect poles and operate a telephone system in the city was read third time and passed.

On motion the city surveyor was ordered not to do work for the city except when ordered.

On motion the time for collecting taxes was extended until the next regular meeting of the council.

The contract for extending the Calapooia street sewer a distance of 705 feet was let to Baker & Strang at \$1.14 per foot, the work to be done within 60 days. The bonds were fixed at \$1000.

A DOUBLE TRAGEDY.

Charles Hewitt Murdered by a Hotel Keeper at Sellwood.

Portland, July 8.—Charles H. Hewitt, a well-known attorney of this city, was shot and killed at Sellwood to-day by Charles Belzard, proprietor of the St. Charles hotel at Sellwood.

Belzard, after the shooting, committed suicide by cutting his throat from ear to ear with a razor. The immediate cause of the shooting cannot be learned as the men were alone when the quarrel occurred. It is thought, however, he had grown out of a "quarrel" in the past.

Belzard, who was a partner in the hotel, who was kept at the hotel, and who was shot by Hewitt, was drinking together in a saloon, opposite the hotel, and both are said to have been under the influence of liquor.

About eleven o'clock Belzard, who was drinking with Hewitt, returned to his home, Hewitt to accompany him home. The men then went to Belzard's house and stayed for the night, occupying the parlor.

This forenoon they were seen together, and were again drinking. On leaving the saloon among the little Alca Matthews, whose pleasant, smiling manner had endeared him to the hearts of all those who so d fortunate it was to know him; and
