FORAGING OBLITERATED

Is the occupation of the soldier the matter of providing a sufficient and satisfactory commissary department, has always been the most difficult question to solve.

The German nation, which has always been the most persistent in its work to perfect the army regulations and plans, has apparently solved this difficult problem as it is announced from Berlin that consideration of this problem has recently resulted in a decision to use the Kola nut in the future campaigns of Emperor William's army.

The properties of this fruit are stated to be almost magical. It is at once a stimulant and a food, and contains within a given space a more nutriment than any other natural or prepared comestible.

While the adoption of the Kola seems to the sanguine young Emperor destined to sweep away the difficulties with which the feeding of an army in the field is attended, thereby simplifying the art of war, and reducing the science of invasion to the level of the meanest military capacity, there are certain features in connection with the nut which will demand the consideration of the Berlin War Office.

The vegetarians assert that if we lived on fruits, we should lose much of the ferocity caused by a diet of meat, and would become sweet and gentle creatures incapable of passion, hate or any other wickedness.

How, then, will the adoption of the Kola affect the fighting qualities of the German soldiers? On the other hand, it would seem that a nut diet develops the climbing capacities of those who use it, and that is likely to render the Teuton armies preeminently adapted for mountain warfare.

For the French Alpine Club officially recommends it as "a stimulant in mountain climbing expeditions." Nor is there any reason to doubt the correctness of this advice, since there are no more agile climbers in the world than the nut-eating squirrels and monkeys.

Probably there awaits for the expedition that is fitting out to explore the rivers of the Congo Free State in Africa, as large if not larger and more important discoveries than have yet been made in the famous dark continent.

It is said that much of the territory has never been conquered by white men, and, from the accounts brought to Stanley, the region is thickly peopled and contains a great central lake like the Nyanzas of equatorial Africa.

It is probable that the leadership of the party will be given to one of the men who acted as Stanley's lieutenants in the Emin relief expedition. Either Neeson or Jephson would be worthy of the honor.
