SALEM MATTERS.

Work on the New Steel Bridge—A Sad Death. Journal: Work is being pushed on the steel bridge across the Willamette at this place. There are now about 25 men at work on the timbers and piling in the river. The people of Polk county are watching the work with much interest, especially woodmen, who find a sale for their wood in Salem. The usual price paid for wood at wholesale is \$2.50 to \$3 for fir and \$3.50 to \$4 for oak; and when fifty cent a load must be paid for carriage there is but little profit left. Nor can a ferry be maintained at a less charge than is now made. All this will soon be done away with by the finest steel bridge that spans the Willamette.

A terrible accident, ending fatally, occurred yesterday in East Salem, in the family of James Watt. They had a woman there, who had a hot water standing on the floor, and while she was absent from the room a little three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Watt fell into the boiler, receiving injuries, from which she died at noon to-day.

So Brain Bit the Dust. The Oregonian says: The party sent down by Major Hainbury of the Columbia from Tongue point to Cathlamet have been working for some time in the vicinity of Three Tree, and every day they notice a big black bear come down to the shore of the river to eat berries. They concluded to have a try for the hide of the animal and sent down to Captain Brown, of the steamer Mandell, for some ammunition suitable for bear. The ammunition was sent, with some joking comments in regard to the improbability of any bear being killed. The next evening after it was received the man who attends to the light at the point met the bear and howled for assistance, and A. L. Upson, who had loaded his gun for bear, rushed out and shot the animal. The head has been sent to this city to be mounted, and as nothing has been heard of the hide or carcass it is supposed they were blown to smithereens.

A Mysterious Engineer. The Astorian Columbian, in commenting upon the prospects of the Albany & Astoria railroad, in which it arrives at the conclusion that the Oregon Pacific is backing the enterprise, says that: "It has been learned that W. B. Barr, who is doing the surveying, is accompanied by a prominent eastern railroad engineer, but his identity cannot be learned, nor is it known what company he represents. While Barr is ostensibly making the survey, this mysterious 'assistant' is really in charge, and Barr is only a figure head to conceal the real projectors of the line."

Mixed by the Enumerators. Clatsop county, outside of Astoria, will fall very short of its actual population in the census. In the neighborhood of Youngs river falls 22 residents report that they have not been enumerated, and on the other side of the mountain 35 residents say they have seen or heard nothing of the enumerator.—Astoria Pioneer.

The Boats.

The water in the river is getting down to such a stage as to make boating somewhat difficult. The river yesterday was only five feet above low water mark. The Oregon Pacific boats Bentley and Hoag will make only one more trip each up this far. It is thought that the Three Sisters, will be able to get out of the Basin down by Oregon City about the 5th and being of lighter draught, she will probably run for some time.

Fined \$5 and Costs. Jno. Monroe, who was arrested Wednesday for being drunk and disorderly, was arraigned in Recorder Hutton's court yesterday. He pleaded guilty to the charge and was fined \$5 and costs. He will languish in the city jail for a few days in lieu of the required collateral.

Beautiful Display. The fine display of fruits and vegetables at Miller & Garrett's yesterday was a great credit to them and one the city can well be proud of. There were so many imported and domestic fruits, and it makes one think they are in San Francisco. Nothing like enterprise.

School Land Fraud. There is great indignation in Tacoma over the attempt of John W. McBride and others to secure possession and title to the larger part of school section 16 under the United States mining laws. The land is worth \$2,000,000, and there is not a better situated tract in or around Tacoma. It is thought the business part of the city, the corporate limits, either west or north, and it lies in a position overlooking both the city and commercial bay. Residences on the city side of it have the most picturesque views of the mountains, city and water of any view in the city. A gulch runs through this land and in this gold has been found. The land for its contiguity to Tacoma, is worth a great deal more than the gold that may be panned out of the gulch.

Hops Way Up. The Salem Statesman says: At Aurora and Butteville the hop contractors are contracting for the coming crop at twenty cents. This is a very good price, and much better than hops have commanded. Already many growers have contracted their outputs at from thirteen to seventeen cents and the present high prices cause them to regret that they offered their product so early in the season. There is great congratulation in the upward tendency of the hop market. The growers are encouraged and will make some money this year.

STROOK BY LIGHTNING.

Four Fine Horses Most Death in a Singular Manner. R. O. Ott brings the report that four fine gray horses, three of which belonged to him and one to George Olcott, were killed by lightning in a recent electric storm on Stangle creek. The band, twenty-five in number, had evidently been lashed together, when the bolt descended and the four were laid low. They were lying side by side, so that they could have been covered by a blanket, and as an evidence of the queer freaks played by lightning, all four had been disembowelled in the same place, the entrails being scattered about near the scene. Mr. Olcott succeeded in collecting the remainder of his band except three, which he has not been able to find. The dead horses were all large powerful animals, and could not be replaced for \$500. He hopes to recover the three missing animals, which he thinks were driven crazy by the shock and ran off into the mountains.—Pendleton East Oregonian.
