A NEARLY FATAL ACCIDENT.

A Man Falls Eighteen Feet On to a Hard Barn Floor. An accident occurred at Tangent yesterday that may terminate fatally. Jas. Sheridan, who was working for Hen. Selteneir, moving away hay, lost his balance and fell a distance of eighteen feet on the hard barn floor. His right thigh was crushed, the bone being shattered and lashed almost to a jelly. Three teeth were also knocked out and his left arm nearly cut. His recovery is doubtful, although he was resting as easily as could be expected of one in such a condition. Dr. J. L. Hill of this city, was called, and set the broken bones.

TEACHERS IN COUNCIL.

An Interesting Letter From State Superintendent E. B. McElroy. The National Council—Teachers from All Sections—Holds Fall And Still They Come.

St. Paul, Minn., July 7. We reached the city to-day ten hours late, having been detained in Dakota by the great storm of this morning. Sunday afternoon, traveling eastward through Dakota, we observed a very heavy and dark cloud rising in the north. This cloud kept rising above the horizon, and it was seen from the train, as a light breeze arose, being that this cloud had the appearance of a hurr cane. At 2:30 o'clock this morning we passed into the storm. It seemed more of a tornado than of a cyclone nature. It was accompanied with a terrible wind and a terrific electrical display.

Our engineer, being very prudent, ran under cover of some heavy warehouses, situated in a small village alongside the track, and this probably the only thing that saved us from being overturned. As it was, the passengers all felt quite certain that we would be thrown from the train before we reached the shelter of these houses.

We remained here until morning, and finally left our wayward train for Fargo, some twenty miles distant, where we found that one train with twelve sleepers on the North R. R. had been thrown from the track by the force of the wind. As we passed eastward toward St. Paul, we found destruction and wreckage on every hand, and the fact that the tornado had been very severe and had covered a large area of country.

This was the only incident of any moment occurring during our trip from Portland to St. Paul. This week the State of Minnesota is being honored with the presence of several thousands of the men and women who are engaged in the work of education in all parts of the Union. We found several thousand of them already in the city, and the dissection of the American educational Council, which occurred on last Friday and Saturday, are receiving here a great deal of attention.

The teachers are coming by the hundreds on every train, and are distributing themselves about in all the cities, towns and villages. Hundreds of them are visiting the various resorts about the two cities. Many of these are very charming places, such as Lake Minnetonka, Minnetonka Falls, etc. Many of them have a great deal of pleasant outing and the result is that the convention will probably not be attended by all of them at any one time. However, the great majority of the leading educators have assembled themselves primarily for the purpose of real business. Subjects of the deepest concern to our people are to be discussed and the teachers who will take up these discussions have long understood the practical situation of the present educational affairs of the United States.

Our national life is very largely moulded and affected by the quality, method and operation of our public school, and the educational people who have charge of this great convention have very much to do with the development of our public school system. Among the teachers present were also very many men and women who are famous for their prominence in the educational world.

We found the hotels crowded. Every hotel register in the city bears the name of a proportion of the teachers and members of the National Council, and those of the Educational Association who have already arrived. No conveyance, however, from the hotel registers, alone. Very many of the lady teachers prefer a private boarding house and home comforts to those of a public hotel. All of these are provided for, as they arrive, at least seven or eight thousand of the entire number of visitors are entertained at private houses in both cities.

Most of the southern delegates have already arrived, and coming just as the spell of hot weather has reached its end. They are loud in their expressions that the north is always cold; and as remarked by one South Carolina lady, "It is like this in mid-summer, what must it be in winter?"

The citizens of St. Paul and Minneapolis are making every effort to entertain their guests. It is estimated that there will not be less than twelve thousand teachers in attendance during the week; and including those who have taken advantage of the cheap rates, that the city will probably be not less than twenty to twenty-five thousand visitors in the city during the convention.

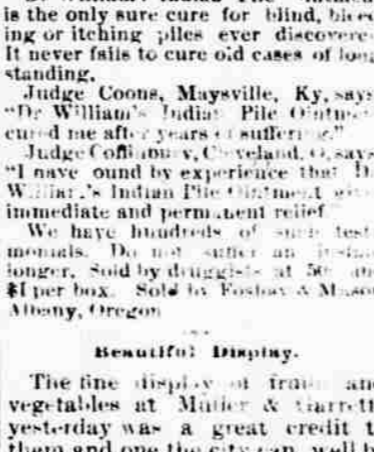
