ANOTHER CYCLONE.

Storms and Cloud-Bursts Continue Their Deadly Work.

A NUMBER OF PEOPLE KILLED

Several Persons Buried to Death in a Tennessee House Fire—News East of the Rockies.

CANYON CITY, Colo., July 22.—About 4 o'clock this afternoon there was a cloudburst in this canyon, a few miles above here, and soon afterward great waves of water came roaring down the Arkansas river with terrific force. The Rio Grande track was washed out in several places and considerable damage was done to property along the bank of the river. One hundred head of cattle was caught by the torrent in the canyon and washed down the river; and drowned.

DESNER, July 22.—At midnight last night occurred a catastrophe that has temporarily isolated the towns up Clear Creek canyon from intercourse with the outside world. It was an immense cloudburst near Forks creek which poured a deluge of water within the narrow walls of the canyon completely demolishing two iron railway bridges at the Forks, and as far as can be learned annihilated all other structures in the vicinity. It is believed no lives were lost but a greater portion of the road-

bed was washed away and means of communication were destroyed. After the cloudburst a furious hail storm set in.

Telegrams from Centerville, Colorado, this afternoon reports heavy rains in that section of the state for the past three days. The afternoon storm culminated in a heavy cloudburst over the Winnebago mountains, doing great damage along the line of the Colorado Central railroad track and bridge were carried away. Two women and a child, camping on Beaver brook, were swept away by the raging torrent and drowned.

A DEADLY CYCLONE.

ST. PAUL, July 22.—A Pioneer Press special from Fargo, North Dakota, says: Reliable information reached here tonight of a cyclone near Canford, in Southwestern Fraile county, which resulted in the death of 5 persons in one instant and the severe injury of several others. Considerable damage was done to property.

A special from Marshall, Minn., says that in the cyclone near Ghent, several miles from here, two persons were killed and several hurt.

THE STORM GENERAL.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 22.—A special from Ashland to the Tribune says a remarkable electrical and wind storm, accompanied by a deluge of rain, passed over Northern Wisconsin and Lake Superior today. A number of houses and barns were wrecked. Reports are to the effect that all the railroad grades are badly washed away.

CENTRAL AMERICA.

Promising Prospects for the Nicaragua Canal—Political Unrest.

NEW YORK, July 22.—The Panama star and Herald of July 5th says:

According to late advices received from Nicaragua the outlook for the canal seems brighter now than at any previous time; but people are not satisfied at the change of opinion, as there has been too much shilly-shallying previously, the feeling being that it is better to see the project through to the end. The project, however, observe, are making much headway on account of the sudden influx of engineers.

A TRENCH OF INTEREST seems to pervade the political sphere of the republic of Nicaragua. In some quarters it is assumed that Dr. Sacaia has from the first intended to return to power if necessary, and he has certainly gone the right way about it. It is generally believed, however, that it will be better for the country if the conservatives and their allies get in.

The Costa Rica congress has approved a resolution taxing the exportation of coffee at 20 cents the quintal. The product of this tax is to be paid for the construction of a theater in the capital city of the republic.

A NEW QUESTION.

A South Dakota Judge's Decision on the Original Package Matter.

CHAMBERLAIN, S. D., July 22.—Judge Haney, of this district, sustained his temporary injunction closing the original package houses of this city. The grounds given or the decision are that the enabling act admitting South Dakota to statehood, authorized the enactment of a prohibition clause in the State constitution. Such enabling act having been passed by congress subsequent to the passage of the inter-state commerce law, the prohibition clause in the State constitution is null and void, and the supreme court decision does not, therefore, apply to South Dakota.

This brings up a new question, which will be carried up, and which, if sustained, will be of great importance to the new states which have adopted prohibition.

THE GREAT NORTHERN.

ITS CARE TO BE RUNNING INTO Seattle By November Next.

SEATTLE, July 22.—The Great Northern railroad to-day awarded the contract for the construction of the Seattle & Montana road from Seattle to a connection with the Fairhaven & Southern railroad, a distance of 77 miles, to Shepard & Co., of St. Paul. Under the contract the work is to be started in five days, and to be prosecuted vigorously.

Col. Clough, vice-president of the Great Northern, said to-day that the work would be pushed to completion this year. The line has already been piled for a mile along the water front, and it is expected that the Great Northern cars will come into Seattle, via the Canadian Pacific and Fairhaven & Southern by November next.

A TERRIBLE EXPLOSION.

A Thrashing Outfit Blown Up and Several Men Killed.

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Cal., July 22.—The boiler of Frazier's thrashing outfit burst this morning a mile west of Mills station of the P. C. railway, fatally scalding the fireman, John T. Fry, who died a few hours afterwards, and crushing the skull of Walter Kyle, who was probably die and severely injured Engineer Ed. T. Frazier. Fry and Frazier were blown clear of the engine along the ground 100 yards, and a part of the engine weighing over three tons, was thrown 125 feet.

A Big Sale.

SEATTLE, July 22.—F. E. Sander, owner of the Yelder avenue and Jackson street cable road, sold today to J. M. Thompson. Accompanied by his wife Sander left

with Thompson for San Francisco tonight, where the formal transfer will be made. The consideration of the transfer is said to be over half a million dollars. Mr. Thompson said to-day that the work of reconstructing the road will be begun at once.

Fatal Railroad Accident.

ANTIGO, Wis., July 22.—In a collision between two freight trains this afternoon, Brakeman Seymour and Fireman Sims were killed. Engineer Wm. Leland had both legs broken and Engineer Ryan was fatally hurt.

Thrashing Machine Accident.

EVANSVILLE, July 22.—By the explosion of a thrashing machine today on the farm of James Narrow, near Princeton, Andy Bretzinger and Chas. White were killed and two others fatally hurt. A number of horses were killed.

An Unsuccessful Voyage.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22.—The whaling fleet of eight vessels that sailed from San Francisco several months ago, bound for a cruise in the Japan Sea, has been heard from. The season thus far has been one of the most unsuccessful in many years. Since leaving San Francisco five whales in all were caught by the eight boats.

CYCLING AND PHYSIQUE.

Danger to Young People in Excessive Wheel Exercise.

In the current number of his quarterly journal, the Asclepiad, Dr. B. W. Richardson, himself an enthusiastic cyclist, presents an article on "Cycling and Physique." He recommends that cycling be delayed by young folks until the body is approaching its maturity. He admits that cycling tends to induce a certain amount of derangement of the conformation of the framework of the body. Every kind of riding which tends to throw the body forward in a bent or curved position, in a temporary or permanent way, will in time produce a fixed bend or stoop. The large muscles in the fore part of the thigh are apt, also, to give under the weight of the rider. On the other hand, he never knew cramp or spasm as a direct result of working the machine; nor sprain, unless in case of collisions or falls.

Competitive cycling he justly condemns. The proper method of riding is to walk, accented, and always to walk steeply, and when the healthy condition of body incident to pedestrian exercise is sustained. Dr. Richardson's own experience is that for every eight miles of distance traveled in conformity with health it is wise to do one mile on foot. In a ride of fifty miles in a day six at least should be done on foot. He utters a warning to those who exhaust their capital stock of vitality by competitive racing; that they do not go back for more capital, no matter how much, not even by rest; for the prime loss from the original capacity. The most and best that can be effected is to keep on, with a measure of the original store of energy dissipated forever.—Chambers Journal.
