The engineer corps of the Oregonian railroad has been running several preliminary lines in and about Scio during the past week, one of which was over the old abandoned line or switch which runs to the warehouse, with a half a mile of new. Yesterday, they surveyed a line from the warehouse through Mill street to the Scio Roller Mills, and adds: That we will have a road there in but little time. Even the spar switch would be better than none. Then a great portion of wheat which has been stored at Munsters and other points will be shipped in the city. Freight could be shipped at any time in the winter without being subjected to the damage of the winter rains. But the spar switch would soon be extending up the valley to the mills and to the coal fields and point mines, both of which are now being developed. Then the line could be operated as an independent system from the main line, as the Lebanon branch is now being run. There is no question but what at a line would pay above operating expenses from the start.

WANDERING IN THE FIELDS.

A Lunatic Causes a Commotion in the County and is Arrested.

For several days a man has been seen in the neighborhood of Knox's Butte acting in a very strange manner, wandering through the fields, picking up the corn and other strange actions, clearly indicating that he was not in his right mind. The people finally became frightened and sent word to Sheriff Scott on Sunday night to come out and arrest him.

Yesterday Sheriff Scott, in company with Deputy Sheriff Smith, went out to John Huston's place, where they found the man in the barn, lying on his face, singing the first stanza to accompany the theme, but when the ban could come in sight he wilted and came down at right.

His name could not be ascertained, as he refused to give any, and could give no account of himself, excepting that his home was in Portland and he intended to fly by until his feet, which were very sore from travel, were better and would then go to work. He talked, sang, and even wept on the road in and appeared to be wholly deranged.

Some former efforts made to arrest him by citizens were resisted with force, the parties being unable to hold him in the back to bring him in.

He is a dark, swarthy man of about 30 years of age, and a foreigner talking quite brokenly, and is dressed quite poorly.

Undoubtedly the man is a maniac and will be placed in the asylum. His mania appears to run up in religious lines, as he was examined by Dr. Maston and Davis, and he was committed to the asylum, to which place he will be removed today. The examination elicited the probable facts that he was a Portuguese, 27 years old, without home, friends or relatives, and bore the name of Antoine De Costa.

Clever Invention. The Oregonian says that Mr. Wm. Grandahl, the Southern Pacific resident superintendent of bridges and buildings, has given further evidence of his ingenuity in perfecting an arrangement for assisting in the work of gravel trains. It consists of a bucket, or extension of the floor of flat cars, which operate to form a continuous floor on the train. In this way the whole train can be loaded with a continuous bill of gravel. The unloading is quite an achievement. A plow, made especially for the purpose, is put on the rear end of the train. The engine is detached, and by means of a long cable, draws the plow, which is the front of the train, quickly emptying the gravel on the ground. A train of thirty cars, which formerly required twenty men an hour and a half to unload, can be emptied in ten minutes, five of which are required to put the cable in place. The company is now using the plow on the gravel trains, which are used in filling in the trestle south of Canby, from the Canby gravel banks.

Murder Will Out. Several years ago a family by the name of Logan were residents of Scio, but moving away they had almost been forgotten. Frank Logan, a member of the family, finally brought up at Empire City, Coos county, where he met his death by a gunshot wound. It was thought at that time and until within the past few days that the homicide was a case of suicide. Wednesday Dr. King of Scio received a letter from his granddaughter, a resident of Empire City, stating that a man, not giving his name, had died there, saying just previous to his death that Frank Logan did not commit suicide but that he, the dying man, shot him. The letter did not state that the murderer said anything in explanation of his crime but was one of inquiry concerning whether young Logan had ever been a resident of this locality.—Scio Press.

Crook County Crops. The season is now far enough advanced that it is possible to calculate with some accuracy what the crop will be, says the Oregonian, and it is generally acknowledged that the grain crop of Crook county is the best that has been raised since 1885. Considerable of the fall grain was injured by frost and dry weather in May, hence it will not yield much of a harvest, but the rains the last of June and first of July brought out the spring grain in fine shape, and even that which was injured by frost will make a fair crop. Farmers now estimate there will be enough oats, barley and rye to threshed in the county to supply the home demand, and of wheat there will be probably enough to furnish about two-thirds of the flour that will be consumed in the county for the next year.

Floating in the Bay. Last Monday a large crowd gathered on the jetties at Newport on account of a large quantity of objects supposed to be seal floating on the bay. MOUNTAIN EARTHQUAKES.

It Shakes Their Little Homes on the Hope—Refers School Closures: Let-

SALEM, July 29.—Persons at Willhoit Springs Saturday night thought they heard and felt a slight earthquake shock. They say it was a slight tremor likened unto that which follows the explosion of a big blast, it rattled dishes and shook furniture.

Hopewere run up from Lane county to day state that in several yards regular New York fire had been found in small numbers. This is the first time this vermin has been noted in yards in this vicinity.

The Linn County National bank succeeds the Linn County bank and the conversion into the national bank, will in a few months, be fully consummated.

Prices Looking Up. The price paid for wheat is advancing and the prospects are better. The Farmers Warehouse Company yesterday were paying 67 cents here and paid 65 cents at Tangen for 15,000 bushels. The company have out of adding additional storage just as long as possible to give the farmer all the advantage in any rise that might occur. The houses are being rapidly cleared for the new crop.
