Richardson placed upon our table yesterday a branch of small bark hickory, hanging full of nuts, from a tree forty years old, and also a branch of hazel nuts, of the regular old prolific variety indigenous to the soil of Illinois and magnificent specimens too. They were borne upon bushes and trees three years from the planted nuts and as fine as ever grew upon the fertile lands of the Sucker state. THE SANTIAM MINES.

Another Rich Discovery Made in the Albany Mining & Milling Co's Claim.

Superintendent Halverson, of the Albany Mining and Milling Company's mines in the Quartzville district, is in the city last night, returned from the mines. He brought with him one of the richest ore yet taken out. It came from the Bonanza mine, on which a force of men are now at work. It is free gold ore and the semi-decomposed quartz is thickly mixed with fine wire gold. Some specimens weighed the fabulous sum of \$26,000 per ton. Mr. Halverson stated that they had enough ore in sight to run a 40 stamp mill day and night for a year. The company has already ordered machinery to work these mines, and an improved stamp mill will be in operation by Sept. 1. The mines are located about 20 miles south of the Oregon Pacific railroad. There is no longer any doubt as to the richness of these mines, and the Albany Mining & Milling Co. has subscribed the necessary money and are going to work them. They are not selling stock but are putting in machinery to operate the mines. The recent rich discoveries up the Santiam has caused much excitement among the miners, and their very reason to believe that they will prove a veritable bonanza. Capt. E. D. Hazen, of Brownsville, is also in the city. He is interested in the mines up the Calapalopa. He states that the showers of last winter caused a ledge of free milling silver ore, and that he has located 10 claims for a Portland company. A trail is being cut into the Calapalopa mines, which are rich in both gold and silver.

About Hops. Geo. W. Hubbard, of Tustin City California, has been in the city the past week. He says the hop crop in the Willamette valley is very good this year, in some parts being a little below the average and in others a little above. A few hops are now being contracted at 17 cents but the growers are slow to contract their hops, as most of them feel assured that at least 20 cents can be obtained by holding on awhile. Great care should be taken in drying to insure the highest market price.—Eugene Register.

Pioneer Lady Dead. The wife of Rev. James Pearl died at their home in Halsey July 31, 1890, after a protracted illness, in the 63d year of her life. Mrs. Pearl was a pioneer of 1852, residing in Linn county since then, where she was respected and beloved by all. She was the mother of ten children, about half of whom survive her, together with her husband, now 83 years of age. A good mother, kind wife and an upright neighbor, another of Oregon's pioneers has gone.

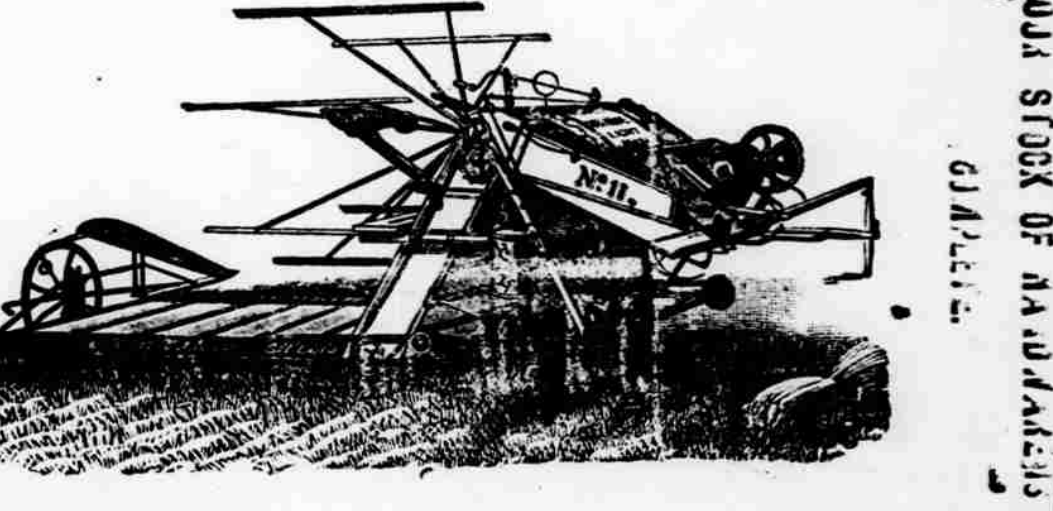
