New York, August 2.—The cruiser Baltimore, flagship of Rear Admiral Bancroft Gherardi, left Bar Harbor at 9 a. m. to-day, and will arrive at the navy yard to-morrow morning.

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## ROYAL GREETING

Russian Duplicity, Cruelty and Pretensions.

THE REMAINS OF ERICKSON'S.

Cholera Epidemic—Best in Chicago—Horrible Prison Discipline—Opposed to the Election Bill.

BERLIN, August 2.—Before starting for Ostend on his way to England yesterday noon, Emperor William held a council on board the imperial yacht. Hohenzollern King Leopold, accompanied by the Count of Flanders went on board and effusive greetings were exchanged between the king and emperor and Prince Henry.

Nothing merited the welcome upon their arrival at the summer palace. Family meetings will be held at Ostend to determine whether Prince Waldemar of Denmark or Prince Oscar of Sweden, shall be placed on the Bulgarian throne. The emperor continued to favor Prince Oscar as the better choice on the ground of his personal qualifications and was opposed to having his brother-in-law ruler of Bulgaria, now assents.

Orders were sent the frontier custom posts and railways, to watch for the threatened migration of Jews from Poland, as the new Russian regulations will tend to drive from the country vast bodies of artisans and poor farming Jews. Leading Jewish firms in Berlin, Hamburg and other cities, have communicated with representative Jews in London. They propose preparing relief for them. The Russian papers announce that transportation to Siberia will shortly be abolished, as a judicial punishment, but omit to mention the fact that it will be maintained as now without judicial sentence. The latest notable instance is the case of the celebrated nevelist, Upenyay. He was arrested at night and confined in a secluded prison, any article of his whereabouts being refused his friends for a long time. Finally it was told that he had been sent to Saratov pending the pleasure of the police. His offense was writing a letter to the czar in support of a memorial of Madame Tzebrikova.

PERIL OF THE CZAR.

A New Nihilistic Plot Discovered in St. Petersburg.

PARIS, August 2.—The Siecle and Figaro print reports that a nihilist plot against the czar has been un-arranged in St. Petersburg. According to these reports Professor Gorlewski, of the university of St. Petersburg, and a number of students of that institution, who, it is alleged, were concerned in the plot, have been arrested. Many persons were taken into custody in Moscow on the same charge. Two officers of high rank in the Russian army have committed suicide. It is supposed they were found implicated in the conspiracy and took their lives rather than undergo arrest and punishment sure to follow.

Lady Dunlo Goes on the Stage.

LONDON, August 2.—Lady Dunlo, whose value as a theatrical star has been greatly increased by the result of the recent divorce suit, will shortly make a tour of Ireland with the "Venus" company, conducted by Manager Harris, of the Drury Lane theatre. She will also appear at that famous theatre with the company next winter.

Lord Dunlo, who was unsuccessful in his efforts to secure a divorce from his wife had an interview with Lady Dunlo since the trial and a reconciliation has been effected.

A Common Meridian.

LONDON, August 2.—An international conference for the purpose of fixing a common meridian is proposed to be held at Rome next year. The conference will also arrange a system of universal standard time. A suggestion which is likely to be most strongly urged upon the conference is to select the meridian of Jerusalem as a common one, replacing Washington and Greenwich.

No Fears of an Invasion.

LONDON, August 2.—In the house of lords last evening Lord Salisbury replying to a question as to the persecution of Jews in Russia, said he could not confirm the reports of edicts against the Jews in having been issued. He saw no grounds for dread of a wholesale invasion of England by Russian Hebrew paupers.

Hooted by the Populace.

LONDON, August 2.—During a large town meeting at Liverpool last night, the upholders of Bishop O'Driscoll in his controversy with Mr. Dillon over the Persico mission matter, were hooted by the populace. There were exciting scenes and trouble was feared. At a late hour the streets were still crowded.

Damaging Storm.

WINNEPEG, August 2.—A destructive hail and thunder storm passed over the eastern portion of Manitoba last night, doing great damage to crops. Many houses in the villages were damaged and two or three people killed.
