THE OCHOCO.

The Albany Board of Trade joins in asking for a Recount in Oregon.

The Albany Board of Trade met at its regular meeting yesterday morning to consider the request of the chamber of commerce of Portland, to join with other cities of the state in asking our representatives in congress to urge that a new census of the state be taken as the same has been, in many places so imperfectly done that the state will be deprived of an additional congressman, to which she is no doubt entitled. The secretary was by vote ordered to telegraph our representatives to urge immediate action in the premises.

This action is no doubt correct as far as Portland, and some other portions of the state, are concerned, especially in southern Oregon, but it would seem a needless expense, as well as a reflection upon the enumerators to take a new count of the entire state, for in many places the count has been accurately taken and no recount is needed. The best way would seem to be to grant a recount in those places where there is good reason to believe the census has not been properly taken.

There is no doubt that Oregon's population is much greater than is shown by the census, and the only way to correct it is by a recount in the districts where it has been badly taken. While the census in Albany has been very accurately taken, the people of this city will do all in their power to aid in correcting mistakes elsewhere. A new census in Albany would show practically the population already given by the enumeration just completed. It is likely that a recount will be granted.

REVENUE AT LEBANON.

A Family Separation Results in a Shooting Affray.

Special to the Herald. LEBANON, August 5.—Isaac Banta and wife of this place separated yesterday, and the wife returned to the home of her parents. This evening the husband went to the house of his father-in-law to see his wife. He was refused admittance by Mr. Williams, his wife's father, whereupon he attempted to enter by force. Mr. Williams procured a shot-gun and shot at Banta three times, when the latter drew a revolver and returned the fire. Banta was wounded slightly in the hand. No arrests have yet been made.

Whistling for Seals. In a note in the American Naturalist, Mr. F. F. Paine of Toronto recalls an interesting fact, which came under his notice during a prolonged stay at Hudson Strait.

"Here," he says, "the Eskimo might be seen lying at full length at the edge of an ice-foe, and although no seals could be seen, he persistently whistled in a low note similar to that often used in calling tame pigeons, or, if words can express my meaning, like a plaintive 'few-ew, few-ew,' the first note being prolonged to about three seconds. If there were any seals within hearing distance they were invariably attracted to the spot, and it was amusing to see them lifting themselves as high as possible out of the water, as though thoroughly delighted with the music. Here they would remain for some time, until one, perhaps, became more venturesome than the rest, would come within striking distance of the Eskimo, who, starting to his feet, would often charge the seal's tune of joy to sorrow. The whistling would be continuous, and was more effective if performed by another Eskimo a short distance back from the one lying motionless at the edge of the ice.

A Lucky Boy Fisherman. A seventy-five pound salmon was caught on July 26th in the Fraser river and was photographed, the fisherman being taken together. The latter was Willie Vianen, 12 years old, the youngest fisherman on the river, and apparently the luckiest. He has caught the two largest fish taken out of Fraser this year. The first one was a beauty, weighing just seventy-five pounds. A living salmon of the weight is no easy matter for a full grown and robust man to handle, and the veritable struggle between the fish and the boy may be more easily imagined than described. THE PRISON FULL OF CONVICTS.

Sept. Downing Thought for Awhile That He Would Need More Room.

The Oregonian says that Superintendent Downing, of the state penitentiary, was down from Salem yesterday. He says he has 323 convicts under his care, two less than at the same time a year ago. "The highest number the prison has ever contained is 334," he said. "When we had them in charge we thought the penitentiary would have to be enlarged, if the number continued to increase. A few new cells are being put in but the convicts are on their good behavior and things are running smoothly. But two men have been in the hospital in the past five months. It is unnecessary to add that the health of this prisoners is good."
