Editors in Clover. Next Thursday night the Marquette Grand opera house, says the Oregonian will have more newspaper men within its walls than it has ever contained at one time. Manager Friedlander has kindly set apart 200 seats for the use of the Oregon Press Association. The orchestra will be dispensed with that night and the time between the acts will be filled by visitors, who will make speeches. Colonel Patrick Henry Winston, of Spokane Falls, is expected to make a speech before the curtain goes up. The association has decided not to go to Astoria, and will make a trip to the Cascades instead. The change in the plans was caused by a letter from Editor Holloran, of the Astorian, who writes that enough money could not be raised in Astoria to pay for more than a fish dinner for the editors.

The Pioneer of Pioneers. The venerable Lindsay Applegate, who has been ill during the past several months, is again walking around. He may well be called the pioneer of pioneers, who led the hosts of civilization to Oregon. Away back in 1843 Lindsay Applegate, with his two brothers, started the first emigrant train for the land whose great river "heard no sound save its own dashings," and he and G. W. Parker, are the only survivors of that historic train. News of the death of Fremont, the "pathfinder," reaching the old veteran the other day, his clear gray eyes lit up with reminiscences of the days when John C. Fremont won the inglorious credit of having made the pathway which the Applegates and their companions brought into existence as a result of their effort to get over the Rockies. The Applegates were the pathfinders, but Fremont, without a scruple of conscience, gobbled the credit.—Klamath Star.

A Tough of the First Water. S. H. Walpole, the tin horn gambler, who jumped from a hotel window at Lebanon and left town to escape a rope in the hands of several indignant citizens, is on the war path. He was very much aggrieved and threatened vengeance because the HERALD would not shield such toughs as he is, and rushed into print in the Evening Democrat. He has been spotted by the police here, and had better lay aside his idea of spilling such a lot of gore, or doing up his ribs to the bottom of the jail.

Oregon's Donation. From the report of the secretary of the Johnstown flood relief commission just published it is learned that Oregon's contribution to the relief of the sufferers in Pennsylvania is \$3,742,818.78. Pennsylvania gave more than any other state and England more than any other country. The total sum with the exception of \$67,205.47 has been expended for the relief of the sufferers.

Simply a Mistake. The old adage that we must go away from home for news seems to still hold good. The Salem Statesman now rises with this startling bit of information. "A Brownsville man offers to donate a buck of land and \$2000 in money toward a new court house at that place. There are others who will do as well and Albany is alarmed." The Statesman man must have been reading some of Palmer & Rey's ancient patent prints. There is no talk of a court house at Brownsville nor has there been for years.

Jefferson Will Celebrate. The citizens of Jefferson have determined upon conducting a grand celebration upon the completion of the fine wagon bridge, across the Santiam at that place. This will be in about sixty days. It is expected. Work on the bridge is now progressing nicely. The framework for the spans is now being put up and the cylindrical piers are being erected and filled with concrete. This bridge will be one long span in the center and two shorter ones that serve as approaches at either end. On the Linn county side there will also be trestle work for a considerable distance, the bank on this side of the river being low and level for a long way.

NORTHWEST NOTES.

Gen. Custer's widow is at Spokane Falls.

Founders, sea-bass and cod are plentiful in the Newport market. It is reported that the Great Northern has more of the right of way between Tacoma and Portland. The street car line in Baker City extends less than 15 blocks, and yet the company finds it profitable to run two cars.

Astoria claims the credit of having the banner A. O. U. W. lodge of the world. The membership is 400, and it costs \$19.50 to join. John C. Davis, who is boring for coal on his place on the John Day river, reports good progress. He has had the depth of 9 feet. Small seams of coal have already been struck and the indications grow better as the work progresses.

It is pretty definitely settled that the Coos Bay & Roseburg railroad will be built from Marshfield eastward, and completed by December 1, 1891, so that the coastwise and Marshfield cars can exchange visits on New Year's day, 1892. The saloon season just closed on the lower Columbia shows the largest pack of any year since 1886, and has only been exceeded by the pack of the previous seasons from 1876 to 1885 inclusive. The latest figures show that 436,000 cases, valued at \$2,620,000 at present prices, have been put up this season.

The salary fixed for the land office for Oregon for the coming year is as follows: La Grande, \$2743.20; Lakeview, \$2812.72; Oregon City and Roseburg, \$3000 each; The Dalles, \$3212.50. The office at Burns, which has been doing business only a little over six months has earned enough to bring the salary to \$2240.70.

Greenbaum, the young man who was lost in the Olympic mountains and wandered four days without food excepting wild blackberries, made a very narrow escape. He wandered across the mountains, deer he had hunted and in the excitement of the chase did not realize how far he was traveling. Under the excitement of a hunter's fever one is not aware of the amount of exertion he puts forth.

New Lake Discovered. Capt. M. W. Hunt and the party he accompanied on the trip in the Cascades, returned last evening and report a most delightful trip. Among other experiences they discovered a beautiful little lake in the mountains, of which they had never heard before and consequently consider it a new find. It is situated about a mile northwest of "Three-fingered Jack," a familiar mountain peak to those who have crossed to or from Franconia, which is a short distance north of the point on the Oregon Pacific railroad where Contractors Hunt and Bennett had their summer headquarters and did a good deal of work three years ago. The lake is beautiful, gravelly shores, and is not surrounded by the thick underbrush and scrub growth characteristic of almost all the mountain lakes. It is furnished by the snow water from old "Jack," is clear, cold and deep, and has no fish; that the hunters could never come and conceal themselves. The party christened it Bowman lake, in honor of one of their number.—Salem Journal.

A Lively Chase. Yesterday morning a lively chase occurred in front of Muller & Garrett's on account of a farmer losing the bottom out of a coop of fine spring chickens, scattering them all over the street. The Santiam Mines. Messrs. W. F. Read, C. E. Brownell and W. H. Bingham, returned yesterday from a trip to the mines of the Albany Mining & Milling Company in the Quartzville district on the Santiam. They went up to arrange for putting in the machinery to work the mines. The engine, boiler and one of the rock crushers are already on the ground. The machinery will be put in place as soon as possible. The ore taken out by the men now at work is the richest ever found in that district, and is free gold-bearing quartz of a comparatively high grade. The company expect that it will prove a veritable bonanza, which will prove a big thing for Albany.

Death of a Pioneer. A. H. Rainwater, who was one of the early pioneers of Oregon, died at his home across the river from this city on the 7th inst., aged 70 years. He had been ill for several weeks with typhoid pneumonia. The deceased came to Albany in 1847, and settled on the farm which had been his home up to the time of his death. The funeral will occur from the residence at 1 o'clock to-day. After the services at the house the funeral will be conducted by the Masonic order, of which he was a member.
