OREGON PACIFIC AFFAIRS.

Col. Hogg and Party in San Francisco—Work on the Road to Go Forward.

By reference to San Francisco papers it is learned that Col. T. E. Hogg, Geo. S. Coe and party are now in San Francisco. It is also learned from reliable sources that some important developments are to be made on the road within a few days.

A gentleman from Corvallis yesterday stated that it is said openly at that place that the Oregon Pacific has sold out to the Union Pacific, but this is not generally believed here, as those in a position to know say that Col. Hogg still stands at the head of the company, and that the road will be pushed eastward with renewed energy, the work to begin very soon.

Messrs. Orman & Crook, it is stated authoritatively will return from Colorado and resume work on their contract toward the summit. Their working outfit is in readiness for them at Gatesville, where it was taken last winter.

There have been many rumors recently concerning the movements of the Oregon Pacific, but it seems certain that the work of construction is to go forward within a short time.

THE ALBANY AND ASTORIA ROAD.

Astoria Column.

Engineer W. B. Barr of the Albany and Astoria road, was in Astoria yesterday and reported good progress on the survey of the line. His engineers are now fifty miles from the Columbia river at the forks of the Nehalem. They are now about twenty-eight miles from the mouth of the river, and will complete their work within three weeks. J. O. Writsmann and Charles Pfeiffer, directors of the Albany and Astoria Railroad arrived on this morning's steamer from Portland. They were met by Chief Engineer Barr, who left with them this afternoon to take them on a trip of inspection over the line of survey. Mr. Barr says they have not the least conception of what the country is like. They have viewed the road merely as a connecting line and have hardly thought of the matter of local traffic. He says the line will run through a splendid country and will get a large amount of local freight. The road will have nothing heavier than a 1 1/2 per cent. grade.

The directors of the Astoria and South Coast know nothing about the matter of letting sub-contracts for extending the main line. The only foundation for it is that J. H. Smith instructed Mr. Johnson to let sub-contracts if the contract for the sale of the bonds in Chicago is signed. When the contract is signed the sub-contract will be let. This has been agreed to by telegraph and the negotiations will be completed in Chicago within the next two weeks.

Walpole's Jump for Liberty.

The Lebanon Express says: Lebanon was thrown into a turmoil Wednesday by an incident which although laughable to the spectators would have proved serious to one party had he not beaten a hasty retreat. For about three weeks a young man who ought to have his hair cut at the expense of the state, has been hanging about town with no other apparent business than that of planning mischief and concocting evil. It is generally understood that he was an abettor of the Banta-Williams shooting affray Tuesday. He had in various ways made himself extremely obnoxious to the public, but the climactic point was not reached until he, in a written and authoritative manner, warned one of our esteemed citizens, John Banta, to leave town under penalty of rough usage. An incensed public on Wednesday, provided a rope for the avowed purpose of hanging the miscreant. John Banta opened the play by charging on the wretch at the St. Charles. He ran upstairs closely followed by several men, but he succeeded in making his escape by jumping from a second-story window. The last seen of him, he was going north at a little more than an average pace, and it is the wish of a great many that he continue his flight until he reaches a climate more congenial than the one he leaves behind.

Another popular excursion to Newport will be given on Saturday, August 23d. A special train will leave Albany at 4:35 p. m., arriving at Yaquina at 7:55 p. m. Returning leave Yaquina the following day at 5:45 p. m., arriving at Albany at 9:05 p. m., making connection with the Southern Pacific train. Those who desire may remain until Monday, returning on the regular train that day. Fare for round trip, including steamer fare to Newport, only \$2. If you intend to visit the seaside this is your opportunity.

About Hops.

Advices from Lebanon state that the hop crop is of an appreciable market. The foreign crop is not so large as usual and the quality not up to the standard. Pacific coast hops will have to be relied upon more largely than was anticipated. It is expected the market will be up and. Hops are well here and there are numerous contracts at 20 and even 22 cents. Very few are being contracted for at any price, growers preferring to hold their product until the market becomes settled.

An Oregon Pioneer.

James Blakely, of Brownsville, who is now at the Dalles, visiting his son, is one of the earliest pioneers of Oregon, and passed through the place where The Dalles is now in 1846. He was captain in the Rogue river war, and has been identified with the history of the state from the date of its first settlement.

IN THE HEART OF THE CASCADES.

Sights and Scenes on the Eastward Line of the Oregon Pacific Railroad.

The writer in company with others, has been spending a few days so profitably in the mountains on the eastward line of the Oregon Pacific railroad, that he is constrained to allude briefly to some of the sights and scenes in this great timber region.

Daily trains are now running to Green Basin, where an Albany company has started a saw mill. The timber along the north fork of the Santiam is the finest in Oregon, and some half dozen saw mills are already cutting it into lumber which finds its way to market over the Oregon Pacific road. The largest of these mills is that of the Santiam Lumbering Company Co. at Mill City, which cuts about 40,000 feet per day and employs 35 hands. In connection with the mill is a shingle and lath mill.

Trout fishing up the north Santiam now is not very good, except in some of the smaller tributaries, where the festive trout are to be found in great numbers. This fork of the Santiam at this season of the year has a milky appearance owing to the location of chalk banks far up the river, which, becoming dry, crumble and fall into the river. This drives the trout up the small tributaries. Several dams built across the river for saw mill purposes also prevent the fish from going up the stream. The state fish commissioners have inspected these and will doubtless make some needed recommendations to prevent the same.

A famous resort for the knight of the rod is at Blowout Lake about 15 miles above Gatesville on the Linn county side. Here a lake about half a mile long has been formed, some say by a volcanic explosion in 1878, and the formation of the lake shows that it was caused by an immense landslide by which a great mountain slid into the stream, creating a beautiful lake.

Farther up the Santiam are the hot springs, owned by Albany parties, which produce a hot water, with the extension of the railroad, a famous health resort. Deer, elk and bear abound in this region.

The track on the railroad is laid about three miles above Coe, a distance of about 60 miles east of Albany. Above this the traveler goes over the old Minto Pass trail which is the way the pioneers used to go over into Eastern Oregon, but it is traveled very little now. The grading done at different times by the different contractors on the road is well shown, and but for a few wash-holes ready for the rails for a long distance. Four miles of track is laid at the very summit and with a moderate force of men the road could now be completed to the summit before the rains of winter fall.

There are large bodies of fine bottom land along the Upper Santiam, which are unsurveyed, and which are only waiting for a small outlay by the government to survey them, when they will be settled up. These are held in some places now under the squatter right law. These lands ought to be surveyed.

The mountains on the Upper Santiam are very rugged and the streams that flow down the mountain gorges into the valley are many beautiful falls, making the scenery most attractive. When the Oregon Pacific road is extended through these mountains this region is likely to become one of the most popular mountain resorts in Oregon.

Banta Arrested.

Sheriff Scott received a telegram yesterday from Roseburg announcing that Isaac Banta, one of the participants in the Lebanon shooting affray, was in that place. He at once telegraphed to an officer there to arrest him, and last evening received a reply stating that he had been placed under arrest. Sheriff Scott will go after the prisoner to-day.

SCHOOL FUND APPORTIONMENT.

Linn County's Share Is \$8,876.80—Salem's Census Prostat.

Special to the Herald. Salem, August 8.—To-day the apportionment of the school funds interest of the state was made. Among the 31 counties of the state the whole sum to be apportioned is \$14,372,15 and the total number of school children in the state, as reported by the state superintendent, is \$99,367, allowing each \$1.45. Multnomah's share of this fund is \$22,422.80; Marion, \$11,524.60; Linn, \$8,876.80.

Daniel Simpson, who was school clerk up to last March and who took the census of this school district, to-day sent a telegram to the Oregon delegation at Washington stating that he was ready to certify that the population of this school district, embracing 12,000, on August 1st last. The census is considered correct on the fact that it gives the four precincts a population of but little over 7000. Another message was sent asking that a transcript of this census of Salem be sent here at once for comparison.
