JOTTINGS ABOUT TOWN.

J. A. Wilson returned yesterday from Newport. E. W. Cundiff and family have returned from the bay. Mr. and Mrs. E. Goin are over from Seio for a few days. Mr. P. Lewis, a resident of Ellensburg, Wash., is in the city. Mr. Lee and family left yesterday for a visit to relatives in Olympia. Mrs. R. F. Ashby returned from Harrisburg yesterday, her daughter being better. E. G. Beardley was up from Portland yesterday in the interests of an independence addition that he has on hand. The McKnight Bros. have their famous trotting horse, Oneco, in training for the state fair races on the McMinnville track. Lane county hop men expect to pay packers 40 cents a box for small boxes this year, and 50 cents for the large boxes. The Eugene postoffice is to be provided with new boxes in a short time. Seven hundred iron boxes have been ordered from the East. Among the throng off for a pleasure trip to the bay were seen C. E. Wolverson and wife, Jas. V. Pipe and family, Van Wilson and one Clarence Vink. Mr. J. W. Cusick and son E. D. Cusick, and Hon. J. K. Weatherford, have gone to their mines in the Calapooia district in Lane county. It is estimated that more people are camping about Newport this year than at any other previous season. There is a big camp on Big creek, about half way to Cape Foulweather. The Chicago Comedy Company disbanded at Yacuma last week, leaving the members without a cent. Some of them succeeded in getting money enough to pay fare out of town. Mr. O. H. Irvine, grand chancellor of the Knights of Pythias of Oregon, has returned from a tour of inspection of the lodges of the state. He has officially visited at the lodges of Eastern Oregon and those north of Albany, twenty-three in all, and will next visit those in Southern Oregon. A company of gentlemen from Nebraska Mr. J. R. Niel's former home, will join with him and R. F. Ashby in forming a land company with a hundred thousand capital, to be known as the Oregon Pacific Land Company, with offices in this city and Portland. Appraising Their Land.

George H. Andrews, secretary and agent of the Oregon & California railway company has furnished some information concerning the much sought-after lands of the company. The company had done as it agreed last winter about starting out parties to survey and appraise lands for settlers, and have four parties in the field now. Mr. Van Meter is at work with a party in townships 1, 2 and 3 north, ranges 5, 6 and 7 west. N. E. Britt is working in townships 4, 5, 6 and 7 south, and 4, 5 and east. Charles J. Howard has five parties in 30, 31, 32 and 33 south, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 west. Mr. LaFlesch is in 25, 26 and 27 south, 2, 3 and 4 west. These four parties of men are examining and appraising the land of the Oregon & California company. The past two years there has been, as is well known, a large immigration into the state. Railroad lands are always in demand by the settlers who have already exhausted their homestead rights; so that last fall and this spring there was a perfect deluge of correspondence pouring into the land office of the company here, asking for prices on their lands. It became necessary, therefore to start out examining parties. The law now at work is expected to examine and price this summer between 25,000 and 280,000 acres of land. Their retiring this fall depends considerably on this season; but the appraisers are generally driven in by the rain about the first or second week in October.

OREGON CROPS.

The bulletin of the Oregon Weather bureau for the past week says: The fall wheat is nearly all cut and considerable of it has been threshed. The late spring sown wheat is almost ripe and promises a much larger yield than was expected. For the fall wheat it is simply magnificent. The berry is large plump and dry and has exceeded all expectations. The yield bids fair to be the largest ever harvested. Columbia county reports say that the crop prospects are unprecedented in the annals of the country. The muskmelon crop of Washington Co., will not be large as last year's. Yamhill county sends in reports of a fine yield. Tillamook county reports hay barley and oat crop good. Polk county reports yield of 45 bushel per acre. Linn county reports wheat. Marion county has more than an average wheat crop, and it is freer from foreign matter than for many years. Benton, Linn and other valley counties report fine yields, some as high as 42 bushel per acre. In Douglas and other counties of Southern Oregon the wheat and other crops are turning out well, at Roseburg samples of club wheat which showed from 100 to 105 grains to the head, and 75 bushel per acre is expected. Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam and Morrow counties have more than average yields, in these counties the berry is not so large and plump, as a rule, as in other Umatilla and Union counties still claim to have one of the largest crops ever gathered and the threshing reports appear to justify the claim. In Willamette, Baker and counties to the east, the crops are fine. Yields more than average. Barley yields of 60 bu. per acre are reported from Crook county and 45 bushel of oats per acre is reported from Klamath county. The hay harvest through the stock country was good and there is more than enough hay for any demands. The second hay crop is being cut in some sections. Hops and fruit continue promising well.
