A STORMY SCENE

Republican senators Hold an Important Caucus. TALK OF ADJOURNMENT.

WASHINGTON, August 14.—The Republican senatorial caucus tonight was the most important yet held. It was a very harmonious meeting. Quay and Cannon both represented the political expediency of doing anything with the federal election bill at present, and urged the necessity of a party adjournment from an early stand-point.

THE FRUIT CROP

The Eastern States Will Experience a Shortage This Year. SPRINGFIELD, Mass., August 14.—The New England Home says: Apples will be scarce and more costly this season than for many years. There is but half a crop of winter fruit in Fatous, Annapolis valley, Nova Scotia, and a still greater reduction in the apple crop of Southern and Western Ontario and Michigan. In Maine and the limited sections of Vermont and New Hampshire there is a fair yield.

BRITISH SEAL POACHERS

Only a Question of Time When Seals Will be Extinct. SAN FRANCISCO, August 14.—Captain Eskine, of the steamer St. Paul, which arrived yesterday from Oonahka, says the Victoria seals this year have secured 2,000,000 in weight, as against the North American Commercial company, which leases the seal rookeries from the government. "It is merely a matter of a few years," said he, "when the seals will be come extinct."

ENGLISH NAVY CRUELTY

Insubordinate Men Placed in Cells and Nearly Starved. PORTSMOUTH, England, August 14.—Crews of the British cruisers have presented a petition to the lords of the admiralty to-day complaining of unwarrantable cruelty toward men found guilty of insubordination. The prisoners are confined in cells situated so close to the boilers that when steam is set up the wretched men are nearly roasted to death. The commanding officers have refused to listen to any complaints, the men have had no sleep for days, and the crews of wanton cruelty.

THE SAHARA RAILWAY

Proposition to Lay a Track in the Great Desert Country. PARIS, August 14.—It is now stated on fairly good authority that the government has decided to build the Sahara railway itself, or guarantee a company that will be held enough to attempt it. Like everything else in the line of gigantic schemes, the Sahara railway seems popular with investors and no less than three companies are now struggling for the honor of bankruptcy in the service of humanity in the sands of the great desert. All these companies have their petitions in the chamber. That fact is embarrassing the cabinet and may lead the government to cast aside all offerings for the work.

FIGHTING IN GUATEMALA. A Big Battle is Daily Expected—Much Slaughtering Done. GUATEMALA, August 14.—The fight at Elmo Rock seems to be more serious than at first reported. It seems that some 2000 troops came to the assistance of the liberals, Salvador troops, and the regular troops. Ezeta drove them and in confusion and captured eight pieces of artillery. The defeated troops retired to Jutiapa. Their ammunition gave out. The pickets of the Guatemalan troops were fired upon at Cotequepa; six men were killed this morning. Although war has not yet been declared, a big fight is expected daily, as this is the only point where Ezeta and his army can enter Guatemala. There are 5000 troops here, 1040 more at Cotequepa, and 3000 scattered along the frontier.

Great Loss of Life

CALCUTTA, August 14.—A flood prevailed in the Ganges river, which has overflowed its banks, and the surrounding country inundated to an extent never before known. There is great loss of life.
