They Are Entertained by their Brethren of the Press in Portland.

The Oregon Press Association convened in Portland yesterday. The following programme had been arranged by the newspaper men of Portland for their entertainment.

On arrival—Members of the Oregon Press Association registered at the Hotel Portland, and reported their arrival at the West Shore office, where the office of the secretary is located.

10:30 a. m.—Lunch at Hotel Portland. The editors assembled at the Marquam Grand theater to receive certificates and badges of membership.

11:30 a. m.—The editors took cable cars to Fifth and Yamhill for Portland Heights and Mayfield's Camera Obscura, which affords a broad and grand view of Portland and surroundings.

At 3 p. m. they took carriage at Fulton Park for a drive through the view of the beautiful city of the "old" times by way of the city park of Nob Hill among the palatial homes of prosperous Portland.

6 p. m.—Meeting with business men at the Chamber of Commerce. 6:30 p. m.—Return to hotel for dinner.

At 7:45 p. m. they re-assembled at the Marquam Grand. Preceding the performance of the greatest modern play, "The Old Homestead," by the famous Denham Thompson Company, there were speeches by the editors. Following each act, short, witty speeches were being delivered by prominent members of the Oregon Association.

Eighteenth Oregon Report.

State Printer Baker's force is now at work on the eighteenth Oregon supreme court reports. The book has already been printed and is now in the hands of the binders, and will be ready in a few days for distribution. This is the first time the Oregon reports have been actually printed by a state printer as such. The new volume contains 600 pages and the edition is of 600 volumes. The reports will be sold at \$4 instead of \$5 and \$6 as heretofore. As soon as the supreme judges return to Salem, and can be ready to read proof on their copy, Mr. Baker will go to work on the nineteenth Oregon report. He thinks there are decisions enough already to make a volume as large as the one just being issued. The printers are nearly through with the copy of the book soon to be issued of the "Resources of Southern Oregon." It is expected to issue these pamphlets by the 1st of September. There will be over twenty thousand of them and they are published by order of the last legislature. The two Eastern Oregon associations were to have published by the state printer the resources of the counties of their district, but no copy has ever been received for the volumes.—Salem statesman.

Kate Riley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Riley, of this city, died at the home of her parents Wednesday night, aged 12 years. The funeral will occur from the Catholic church at 3 o'clock. The bereaved parents have the sympathy of the community.

The Deer Law.

As the deer law now in force is not generally understood, we will give it in substance: The law forbids killing at any time if not used or sold for food, or being having in possession or trying or selling during the season. Forbids killing at any time for the hide, horns or hams. Bucks may be killed from July 1st to November 1st and does from August 1st to January 1st, to be used for food only. Stuffed skins are not to be killed at any time.

An Alleged Son of Joaquin Miller, the Poet, Flits from Prison.

SALEM, August 14.—John Miller, aged 29, a supposed son of Joaquin Miller, the poet of the Sierras, made his escape last night from the penitentiary, where he has been confined for the past four months. Miller was a trusty, working at the reform school, and taking advantage of the darkness, escaped from the house in which he was sleeping. Miller was sentenced to Portland for a two years term for the crime of larceny. In the bridge matter nothing has yet been done. The hide dealer became enraged and told him that it was none of his business whether the sack contained deer hides. The law prevents the railroad carrying deer hides, and the employees are careful about what they receive for shipment.—Eugene Register.
