Storage Batteries. Dubuque, Iowa, is to try the storage battery system of running electric cars. A car has already arrived which will be experimented with, and if satisfactory the entire road will be fitted with cars of this character. The cars are equipped with batteries which are placed under the seats, out of sight. The batteries are charged with enough current to run the car fifty miles. When the car has nearly run this distance it is taken to the power house, and a new set of batteries put in requiring but a minute to make the change.

The Board of Trade are entitled to a well deserved compliment for the manner in which they took hold and worked up the interest that led to the hearty co-operation of the business men and citizens generally in the matter of the very pleasant reception given to the party. Mr. J. H. Towns-end met the party at Salem and accompanied them here, and found them to be a pleasant and social body of gentlemen. The Portland deputations were somewhat surprised that the Salem Board of Trade, who had been given due notice, entirely failed to meet them at the depot there.

They one and all expressed themselves much delighted at the cordial and substantial reception given them here. There had been prepared under the auspices of the Board of Trade of this city two large tables arranged on the depot platform. By the kindness of Mrs. J. A. Gross they were covered with nice, white linen table cloths. The Oregon Land Company had its fine collection of fruits of all kinds in glass jars.

Wallace & Cusick were on hand with a large supply of freshly picked apples from the orchard of Mr. J. W. Cusick, and the Board of Trade had a large supply of peaches, grapes, apples, watermelons, etc.

Mr. S. N. Steele was present with a well-arranged cabinet of specimens from the Santiam mountains, which together with the coal exhibit of Writaman & Hulbert made a fine display. The display of cherries, plums, prunes, strawberries, peaches, currants, gooseberries, pears, and samples of oats, wheat, timothy and green corn in the stock presented an attractive and beautiful sight, eminently suggestive of the great future and wonderful resources of the Willamette Valley.

When the party went to board the train for Corvallis Mr. G. W. Wright, president of the Board of Trade, in behalf of the Board of Trade of this city, presented them with a box of fine peaches and one of grapes and a liberal supply of watermelons, muskmelons, apples, etc., as souvenirs of the fertility of Linn county, and the good wishes of our city towards the distinguished party.

The Portland deputation were loud in their praise of the treatment accorded them here, and said that from now on they should as a Chamber of Commerce work for the Willamette Valley and the whole state as well as Portland. Such exhibits and receptions as this one serve to build up and advertise our beautiful city, as these Eastern gentlemen will carry back with them, so they said, pleasant memories and good words for Albany.

THE OREGON EDITORS.

They Were Royally Entertained by Their Brethren of the Press in Portland.

PORTLAND, August 16, 1890. The hundred or more members of the Oregon Press association, representing nearly every portion of the state, arrived in Oregon's metropolis Thursday and were received in a most hospitable manner at the Portland, the magnificent new hotel, the best, without exception, on the coast, and were given the best the hotel afforded.

At the West Shore office, and at the Marquam Grand theatre, they registered and were furnished with unique souvenirs in the shape of programmes—a passport for almost everything in the city apparently.

President Osborn, of the chamber of commerce, gave a short and pithy welcoming speech, and then the Portland gave lunch in a mode.

The cable road then whisked the entire party up one street, down another, hither and thither and straight up the side of a mountain, the same even, rapid rate of speed being kept up all the time. A view of the powerful machinery that works the several miles of cable was not a little interesting under the direction of the superintendent of the works with great interest.

After the cable came a ride on the electric motor cars to the end of the line, at Fulton park, South Portland. From Fulton park carriages were furnished and the party taken through that most beautiful of all resting places for the dead, Riverside cemetery; thence through the most beautiful residence part of the city and the intricate winding road to and from the beautiful City park.

The evening was spent, first in a meeting with the Chamber of Commerce, at which it was decided that the association favored the inauguration of a state board of trade—and afterwards at the Marquam Grand Theatre to witness a most beautiful and realistic rendition of the "Old Homestead."

Yesterday part of the party started on the train for frontiers, but were stopped short of their destination by running into a freight train and splitting open the caboose. Luckily, no one was injured, but the ones who were on the train failed to get back in time for the boat up the river to Multnomah Falls, a most enjoyable trip, on the last steamer Undine, the business session was held and the way back after taking on the straggling ones, who, after the railroad accident, procured the Salem to take them out to meet the Undine.

At the business meeting officers were elected and Astoria was selected as the next place of meeting. Today the time was fully occupied with a ride on the electric motor line, and a steamboat excursion to the Oswego iron works and Oregon iron City. Truly three very busy days of wonderful sight-seeing have been spent in Oregon's big city, Portland.

PROGRESSIVE PORTLAND. The meeting of the pencil shavers of the state at the metropolis of Oregon has been of practical utility. It has accomplished one desirable result at least and that is to make the association one of the important future gatherings in the state.

The annual meetings bring the newspaper men together in fraternal greetings, make them acquainted, create a change of ideas and as a natural consequence, lead to a better and more extended journalistic work. They should be extended and encouraged.

In the present one the city of Portland exhibited a generosity in entertainment truly magnificent. The only drawback to it is that in future meetings comparisons will be made to the treatment of such a group of Portlanders, and for, of course no other city in the state, can begin to offer the attractions that Portland can.

Oregon is proud of her metropolis, and well she may be, for Portland, with her magnificent and mammoth business houses—second to none on the coast—her numerous systems of street railways, including the electric, which runs the entire length of the city and out to Fulton park, and the cable line to Portland heights, which is the finest equipped line in rolling stock and improved machinery in the known world, stands as the city of cities of the Northwest.

The growth of Portland has been of that permanent and solid character which indicates that she is as vigorous for the future as she has been in the past, and as lasting as the everlasting hills upon which she is prettily built.

A Slenderer Rebuked. The Oregon City Enterprise well says: "The Chehalis Nugget casts a dirty sling at the Willamette valley, when it says that the hop crop through Western Oregon is almost an entire failure, through the ravages of the hop lice, which seems to get into the entire Willamette valley. He goes on in this strain and says the wheat crop is a failure and that tons of half grown apples are rotting on the ground. Never was more flagrant untruth uttered, as the residents of Oregon well know. The wheat crop of Oregon, while the yield is hardly as large as usual, is well filled with extraordinary quality. The fruit prospects of the Willamette valley were never better, and the fruit is sound and healthy, while no one in this country has ever heard of hop lice in this vicinity."

LOOK OUT FOR YOUNG MILLER.

He Escaped from the State Reform School Farm and the Police Want Him.

Superintendent Downing, of the state penitentiary, is out with a circular offering a reward of \$50 for the capture of John Miller, aged 20 years, who escaped from the state reform school farm near Salem, on Thursday. Miller is five feet seven and a quarter inches in height, and has blue eyes, light complexion, light hair, and a prominent nose. There are scars on the right index finger and thumb and on the second, third and fourth toes of the right foot and one, an inch and a half long on the edge of the hair on the right side of the forehead, and another on the left index finger. There is a mole below the point of the right elbow a little to the right of the point of the left shoulder. There are six large gold fillings in the front teeth.

The Albany police have been notified and are looking for Miller.

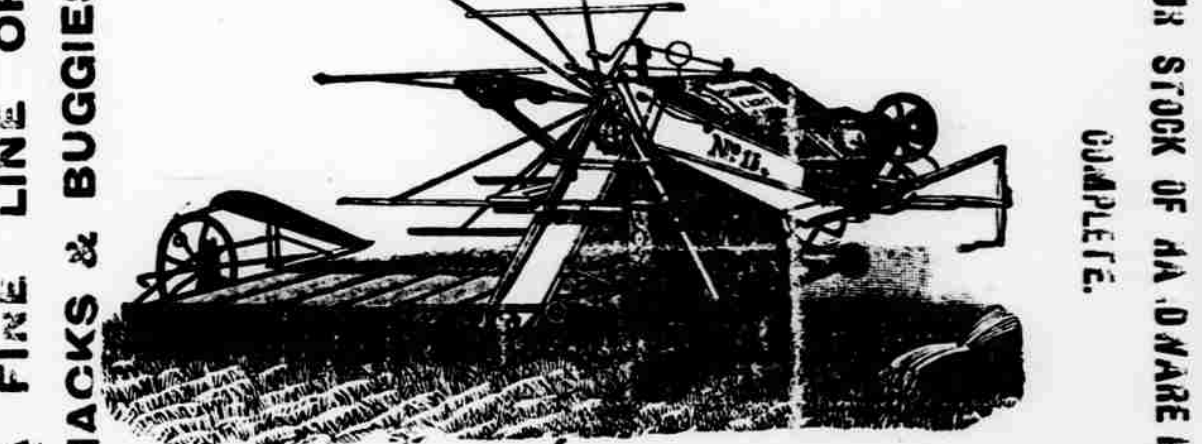
