THE PACIFIC TIME TABLE Arrives Albany

A SENSIBLE AND ABLE AD. DRESS.

In his annual summing up of the affairs of the Grand Army of the Republic, at the National Encampment at Boston, Commander in Chief General Alger made some excellent suggestions and a very able address.

The hearty applause with which his best passages were received by the representatives of the veterans of every state in the Union was an earnest of the spirit of harmony and moderation which would inspire the business sessions of the national council.

On the question of pensions, respecting which there has been a division of opinion among the veterans for several years, General Alger was at once outspoken and judicious, dealing with it in a practical way, without exciting criticism from any quarter.

Frankly acknowledging that the failure of the service pension policy had caused much disappointment among thousands of veterans, he gave the precise reason for the unwillingness, or rather the inability, of congress to sanction it. The enactment of such a law would have created a large deficiency in the national revenues. This is the sum of the whole matter. General Alger's comments upon the existing expenditures for pensions, exceeding \$150,000,000 annually, will do much to reconcile the advocates of the service pension to the disappointment of their hopes.

"Let us be just to our law-makers," he remarks, "even though they have not given us all we asked. No country on earth is ever has been nearly as generous to its soldiers as ours." This commendation of the action of congress is most opportune. The disability bill recently enacted in, as General Alger has no difficulty in proving, a very large and generous measure, with which the Union veterans can well afford to be content.

The recommendation of the commander in chief respecting the removal of the remains of the illustrious general of the armies from New York to Washington and the erection there of a magnificent memorial building, "such as will be a credit to the whole people," will meet, with approval in many parts of the Union. The people of New York have disappointed the reasonable expectations of the nation by their inaction and neglect of patriotic duty. The collapse of the Grant monument enterprise sufficiently discredited the reputation of the metropolis; but the erection of an ugly stable near the shabby vault has been a crowning disgrace which has excited the indignation of the country. If resolutions are offered in congress in favor of the transfer of the ashes of General Grant to Washington, and the Grand Army heads a national movement in the same direction, the people of New York may be humiliated, but they will not have the best cause for complaint. They have not availed themselves of a magnificent opportunity of building a monument to the most illustrious American soldier after Washington. They have suffered the Tammany gang of politicians to create a public scandal that will be a lasting reproach to the good name of the city.

The annual reports submitted to the National Encampment show that the Grand Army is steadily increasing in numbers and works of mercy. Its membership was never so large as it is now and its charities are commensurate with its patriotism. Surely critics of the organization, who are addicted to vulgar denunciations of the Union veterans and as "pension grabbers" and "subsidy beggars," will do well to exercise self-restraint. The fact that the organization has expended during the last year \$221,350.18 for the relief of 28,419 cases is an adequate

vindication of its character. The Grand Army is not to be compared to blind Belshazzar standing at the doors of a National Capitol and asking alms, but rather to the good Samaritan, binding up the wounds and pouring in oil.

ANOTHER WAR SCARE has arisen in the East over the ordering of the revenue cutter to the Behring sea, with supposed orders to seize British sealing poachers. When viewed calmly by the conservative people of the West such war prattle resolves itself into news in no wise calculated to create excitement. There is very little danger of war over the Behring sea trouble. The rival sealing vessels will soon have the seals exterminated, leaving nothing to fight over.

A TERRIFIC cyclone dealt out its destructive force upon Wilkesbarre, Pennsylvania, yesterday, demolishing buildings, uprooting trees and causing universal devastation and extensive loss of human life. The unwarned advent of these dreaded storms makes them a terror above all other destructive agencies of nature.
