Money in Hops. In the Willamette valley the hop crop of this year will probably be thirty thousand bales, with an average of about 180 pounds to the bale. This makes 5,400,000 pounds. Every cent of rise in the market makes a difference of \$54,000 in the value of the Willamette valley hop crop—that is, if no one had contracted. If no one had contracted the present price for "choice lots," 25 cents a pound, would bring nearly a million and a half of money to this valley.

It should be Done. It is understood that mail will be carried on the Oregon Pacific train eastward soon. This certainly ought to be done, as trains now run daily and the public along the road have to wait for the primitive semi-occasional trips of the mail carriers.

AN AMERDE HONORABLE.

The Oregonian Explains Seemingly Unjust Aliases to Albany.

In reply to a recent communication published in the HERALD, the Oregonian, under the heading of "No Offense, Kind Neighbor," says:

"A soft answer turneth away wrath, but grievous words stirreth up strife." In an account of the trip made up the valley by a party of Omaha councilmen, published in Sunday's Oregonian, through one of those unaccountable blunders which will occasionally occur in type-setting and proof reading, the word "Albany" was omitted in the following sentence:

"Owing to the San Francisco express having been delayed, the train got behind time, and so a very brief stop was made at Salem, and fast time was made from there to [Albany,] where dinner was furnished."

The editor of the Albany HERALD allows a correspondent to make this omission the occasion for saying some very harsh and unjust things in regard to the Oregonian. The omission was regretted, but as in a paragraph just below the other the name of Albany was mentioned in connection with the fine fruit, etc., presented the party there, no reference to the unfortunate omission deemed necessary.

The party was highly pleased with the cordial greeting they received at Albany and greatly admired the fine display of fruits made, and surprised and delighted when the whole display was bestowed upon them. Their only regret was that it was impossible for them to stay long enough to enjoy the hospitalities so lavishly extended."

We are authorized to say that our esteemed exchange, the Oregonian, is assured that the authors of the Oregonian correspondence referred to relative to the Omaha party's recent visit to this city and mention thereof in the Oregonian, were actuated by no unkind feelings in penning the article referred to, but that they were actuated solely in the belief that justice had not been fairly done our city in the premises. The authors, we are assured, are readers of and kindly disposed toward the Oregonian, and authorize us to say that they trust that a kind and neighborly feeling may continue between the two cities to the end that they may always stand shoulder to shoulder in the furthering of every interest that is calculated to promote the mutual growth of each, and of the whole state, and that their belief is that the Oregonian is more able to promote such mutual growth and prosperity than any other single agency in the state.
