C. C. Polling, to open the door, the key failed to do the work. Some fellow versed in police literature had no doubt been there. The question is, who was it that had been tampering with the lock on the church door?

But further, Mr. Fisher had been cave-dropping or perhaps acting as a detective, as we would perceive from the literature he peruses, but be that as it may, on Saturday evening following the opening of conference Mr. Fisher went out to Mr. McGregor's house, seven or eight miles in the country, told his wife first, then went to the field where Mr. McGregor was plowing and told him he had a very painful duty to perform; that he (McGregor) had been guilty of an attempt to break into a home (we know that means a penitentiary act), and that if he did not withdraw from the church he would be compelled to have him arrested. McGregor was not one of the Bowman worshipers, and if Fisher could bulldoze him by false threats to withdraw from the church it would render McGregor's office as trust a vacant. Readers of the Herald will remember that he was such an unholily conduct and by a would-be preacher? This is the unfair way in which he undertakes to get the control of the church property. The highwayman at an unsuspected moment assaults a victim with a drawn sword, robs him, and then tells him that he will deliver up his money or he will fire.

Bowersox is admitted only in two church buildings—a presiding elder. Rev. Youst has charge at Salem, Rev. Hollinger at Lebanon and Rev. Holsinger at Albany. It will be remembered that these four ministers stood with Bowersox at the conference, and it would be folly to say that he would not be admitted among his own ministers. He has ten or twelve churches. I know of only three others—Albany, one below Oregon City and one in East Portland now in litigation. Fisher has a great deal to say about the brazen eleven—that they are dropping out of the ministry rapidly. Dr. Locke and Trevor, at Salem. He knows that these two have not been taking work from the conference for several years. They preach occasionally, as they have done. Fisher says that Mr. Beaumont, of the eleven, has went to work in a saw-mill. I do not know whether this is true or not. If it is true, I do know that it is more creditable of him than he would blun his rent off the church.

Mr. Fisher closes his article by saying that he prefers the Police News rather than a religious paper, and then immediately follows by saying, "You're in defense of the church." What! Stigmatize the church?—blacken the cause of religion? A man of his calibre to assume such a responsibility—disgrace himself and satiate his vanity. 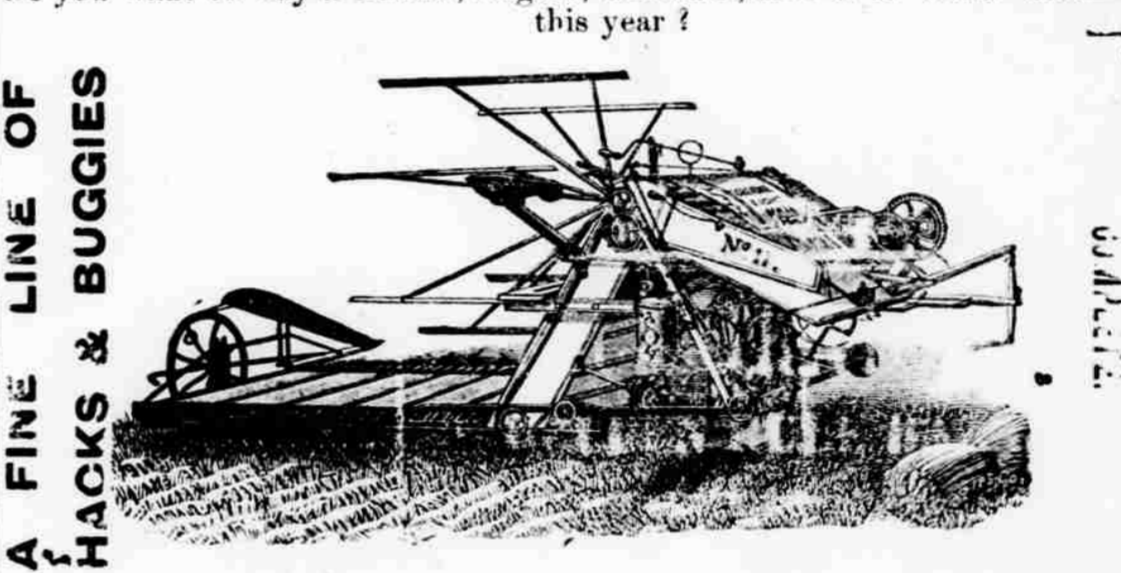
