Look out in the valley for the counterfeit two dollar bills. They are an excellent imitation of the genuine. There is one intaglio way to test them and other United States paper money. Take a pin or needle and run it under the silk fibre that is scattered through the paper of the bill. If with the pin you can pull up the thread so that it is plainly visible, then you can take that money for the face of it. The counterfeit two are silver certificates. Several counterfeit silver dollars have been passed in this city this week.

A Valuable Stone. Mr. Charles Kennedy, conductor on the O. P. passenger, has an unique watch chain, key-stone, made from a water gate. The agate, an unusually large one, was picked up on the beach near Newport, and had been washed either by you or by his son, though it was difficult to tell whether it was petrification, it had been an oyster, crab or clam shell. It was cut and engraved in Chicago, at an expense of \$30 or \$40, and is a "key-stone," with a passenger coach in the center, surrounded with letters such as are usually placed upon a Masonic emblem of this kind. One peculiarity of the stone is that it will cut glass equally as well as a diamond. You can see through it just as if it were glass. There is a huge piece of water inside the key-stone, with a large space for movement, when the stone is turned about in the hand. We believe it is the largest, handsomest and solidest petrification of the kind in existence, and its value can hardly be estimated in dollars and cents.—Yaquina Post.

RAILROAD STREET SEWER.

It Will Be Reduced to 18 Inches and Extended Through to Ninth Street.—Other City Improvements.

STATE DISPATCHES.

Portland Suffers a \$15,000 Fire.—The ses.

News from Eugene—Sheriff Sloan's Defalcations.—The Hop Lease.—Yamhill Pioneer Dead.

PORTLAND, August 30.—At 4:25 this morning Officer Ryan, of the police force, discovered fire issuing from the rear of the Dickson building at the corner of First and E streets. He ran to the nearest fire alarm in an alarm, which caused the department immediately responded.

The fire soon got beyond control owing to the absence of sufficient water to cope with the situation, and in a few minutes the adjoining building, situated on the lot owned by George Woodward and W. K. Smith, were in flames. The fire boys did their best, but in spite of their greatest efforts, the roof of the new Clarendon building caught fire, and then the situation looked serious, for it seemed that the entire block would be swept away, endangering considerable surrounding property. The fight lasted nearly an hour, and the result was the total loss of the Dickson and Woodward buildings, on which no insurance was held, owing to the extreme high rates charged by the companies. The roof of the Clarendon building was burned off and one of the rear corners was taken away. It is owned by Judge Capies, S. G. Bunting and the Mulkey estate, and sustain damage to the extent of \$500, insured with home companies to the amount of \$500. The upper story was occupied by Mrs. Frank Olson as a lodging house of unsavory reputation. Her loss is about \$1500 to furniture, fully insured. She also has a restaurant and saloon in two of the ground floor rooms, which were damaged \$500 each, fully insured.

The other parties who occupied store rooms in the building, all of whom were uninsured were: C. F. Peusch, plumber; loss, \$100. C. J. Smith, marble cutter; loss, \$75. Landigan, pawn shop; loss, \$100. E. Couper, cigar works; loss, \$20. A. Mosowitch, jeweler; loss, \$80.

The first street buildings were occupied by Whitson & Miller, drugist; loss, \$1500; insurance, \$750. Mrs. Baker, lodging house; loss, \$1200; insurance, \$900.

The other stores were occupied by the Chicago restaurant and two saloons, the loss upon all of which will aggregate about \$300. The buildings were partially burned about six weeks ago and had just been repaired at a cost of about \$200.

Loss on Dr. Dickson's building, \$3000. On Woodward & Smith's, \$3000. At the rear of the Dickson building were two small roomers in which lived a lot of disreputable persons who, it is thought, are responsible for the fire which undoubtedly was of incendiary origin. The total loss looks up about \$15,000.

EUGENE NEWS.

Hop Lice Discovered Defalcation of Sheriff Sloan.

EUGENE, Or., August 30.—Prof. F. L. Washburn of the experiment station of the State Agricultural College, visited the hop yard of S. Meel, on the Mackenzie, this week for the purpose of ascertaining as to the presence of the reported hop louse in the yards of Lane county. He is authority for the statement that he found the genuine hop louse (phorodon) in considerable numbers. He says there is no reason to believe that the hop louse has made its appearance in Oregon.

The commission appointed August 6 to examine the books of Ex-Sheriff Sloan, of this county, today reported to the county clerk of the county their findings in an itemized report. The report shows a balance in favor of the county of \$3,791.20. The report is the result of a thorough examination of the books of the office, which were found to have been properly kept. While part of the affidavits and important memoranda have been lost, Mr. Sloan will not hesitate to settle accounts with the county as returned by the commission.

A Pioneer Dead.

McMINNVILLE, August 30.—Jos. Watt, of Amity, died suddenly of heart failure at his home at noon. He was a well known and prominent man, and was president of the Oregon Pioneer Association. He crossed the plains in 1843, was aged 73, and leaves a wife and several children.

Accident at Eugene.

EUGENE, August 30.—While crossing the railroad near the university this afternoon John Blume and his wife and child, together with their buggy, were thrown down a steep embankment and sustained serious injuries. Mr. Blume's leg received a bad fracture.

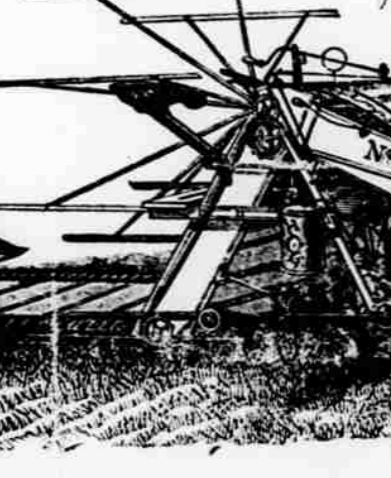
