An insurance expert estitied that there were records of eventy two fire; similar o that which destroyed the Egypt. The trouble was due, he said, to the American system of packing cot-ton. If American shippers would adopt the methods employed by shipgers of cotton from India, in--urance companies would make large reductions in the rates upon cargoes composed wholly or in carrying them. 
