The court adjourned till Thursday afternoon to visit and inspect the Sanderson bridge in the forenoon.

A Peculiar Disease.

The thoroughbred Shorthorn cattle which S. J. Newton imported recently from Kentucky were affected with sore eyes when they arrived here, though Newton did not consider it anything serious, as he had certificates from inspectors of states he passed through that the cattle were perfectly sound. But since the cattle arrived here their condition has not improved, and it is feared the disease is contagious, as cattle that have come in contact with them are similarly affected. Mr. Newton pastured his cattle at Frank Hewitt's place near The Dalles, and Mr. Hewitt's cattle are affected with the disease, also cattle belonging to the Baldwin Sheep & Land Co. at Hay creek, where Mr. Newton stopped on his way from The Dalles, are afflicted with sore eyes. When first taken the eyes are inflamed and discharge water freely, afterward a scum accumulates over the eyes, and in some cases the animals become totally blind, but afterward regain their sight. If any one knows what the disease is or knows of a remedy they will confer a favor upon the stockmen of this county by making it known. We are reliably informed some cattle in the county were similarly affected before these were imported.—Prineville Review.

Wheat Seventy Cents.

Corvallis is paying more for wheat to-day than any other town in Oregon and has been doing this for the past week. Our market has been firm for six days at 70 cents per bushel, although our neighboring towns in the valley have been offering only from 66 to 67. Unquestionably the San Francisco market will not justify our figures, but farmers find a ready market at that place just the same. This, of course, places some of our boasting neighbors in an embarrassing position and the papers of Albany have been trying to explain that our inflated prices have been caused from bitter competition and spite-work among our dealers. Well, perhaps a poor explanation, but better than none, but the unvarnished truth still remains that we are paying four cents per bushel more for wheat than Albany.—Corvallis Times.

Discharged For Cause.

A man was brought before a Missouri justice of peace, charged with the offense of kissing a young lady "by force and violence, and against her will." The young lady, who was very handsome, gave her testimony in a modest and straight forward manner, after which his worship gave the following decision: "The court in the case sympathizes with the defendant, and will therefore discharge him without a fine, imprisonment or reprimand, because the court, during the time this case has been on trial, has been obliged to hold on to both arms of his chair in order to keep from kissing the complainant himself."

SKIN GRAFTING.

A Delicate Operation Performed at the Hospital in Astoria.

Astorian: The delicate operation of skin grafting was performed at St. Mary's hospital a few days ago by Dr. J. A. Fulton. The patient is Ole Anderson, who had his left foot badly crushed at the jetty about two months ago. The skin from the ankle down the side of the foot for the space of four or five inches square was torn off and the flesh left exposed.

A few days ago Dr. Fulton decided to graft some new skin onto the injured member. From the leg of Anderson several strips were taken, but not enough to cover the space necessary.

Another patient offered to lend Anderson a little section of his cuticle. The offer was accepted and from the patient's arm enough was taken to complete the operation, and four out of the six strips are growing nicely, and in a short time Anderson will have a skin all over the injured foot.

The Albany College.

The Albany Collegiate Institute has just issued its annual catalogue. It begins its twenty-fourth year on Wednesday, September 10. The college was founded by the Presbytery of Oregon in the fall of 1866. Seven acres of land within the limits of the city of Albany were donated by Thomas Bonifeth and wife and an \$8000 building was immediately erected.

Rev. William J. Monteith was the first president and Rev. Elbert N. Condit is the present incumbent, having served eight years. There are four departments of study in the institute, collegiate, normal, business and primary. The course of study extends through four years and embraces philosophy, history, language, literature and science. There are now entered for the coming year in the various departments 134 students, the greatest number in the history of the college. Owing to the increased attendance at the college, a new building is being erected for the convenience of students.—Oregonian.

OREGON'S COMMISSIONER.

He Has Been Called to Attend a Special Meeting at Chicago.

EGGERS, OR., September 3.—Hon. M. Wilkins has been called to attend a special meeting of the World's Fair commissioners at Chicago on the 13th inst., to reconsider the question of accepting the site offered by the committee for the fair grounds. Mr. Wilkins is proud to have been one of the eleven who voted against the acceptance of the site on the first vote, and thinks the change suggested is of vital importance. He is wide awake to Oregon's interests in the fair and is doing some good preparatory work toward getting the product of the state ready for a creditable exhibit. He says he never goes into such work except to win, and he has already won numerous medals which are the pride of Oregon. Lane county has won many prizes in competitions of this sort, and will contribute generously toward the state exhibit in 1893.

The First Report Was Incorrect.

LINKVILLE, OR., Sept. 3.—The dispatch dated August 31st, which stated that Tom Miles had shot and killed Joseph Backmaster, is incorrect, notwithstanding it was based on a report from the scene of the shooting given by one of the parties riding with Miles who was present at the time. After shooting a hole through Miles' hat Backmaster turned to ride away when Miles returned the fire, inflicting a very bad, though not fatal, flesh wound in the shoulder.

Articles of Incorporation.

PORTLAND, Sept. 3.—Articles of incorporation of the Oregon Pacific Land Company were filed in the office of the county clerk this afternoon by J. R. Neill, R. F. Ashby and August Lange, with a capital stock of \$100,000.

SALEM, Sept. 3.—The baseball game between the Portland and Salem clubs this afternoon resulted in a victory for Portland. The score stood 9 to 3.

PRIVATE TYPEWRITERS.

You have no idea to what an extent typewriters in the departments—the operators. I mean, not the machine—are utilized by their superior office hours, says a writer in the Washington Critic.

Any number of government officials who want to be authors have their manuscripts type written in the department free of charge. Of course, it is all one to the department typewriter, whether the work is for the government or not, but it is a great injustice to outside typewriters, who thus lose a great deal of work.

I can tell you a pretty good story in this connection. Up in our department there is a lady, the daughter of a distinguished general now dead, who does a good deal of writing for the cheaper class of magazines, and always has her manuscripts copied by one of the type writers in the department. One day she took the manuscript of a short article, written for a well known woman's magazine, to a young woman who had recently been appointed as copyist in the department to have it transcribed.

The young woman, it seems, had had some dealings with magazines herself, and not being troubled with conscientious scruples, she made two copies of the article, mailed one to a periodical to which she had before sold some matter, and under some pretext delayed delivering the other one to its author for some time. The article was promptly accepted and a check for it sent to the typewriter.
