A big cougar was killed last week on Damon's point, Gray's Harbor, by a lucky charge of buckshot delivered in the head by an Indian hunter. The varmint had just killed a colt, and was as large as a fair-sized colt himself—being nine feet in length from tip to tip. His legs were short and stout, with ponderous feet.

An employee of the steamer Evangel, saved his life by his presence of mind. A lamp exploded in the engine room, throwing the oil over him and enveloping him in flames. He immediately sprang through a window, taking the glass and sash with him, and falling into the water was of course "put out" in a jiffy.

Charles Newton, of La Grande, killed one of his horses the other day in a fit of anger. While engaged with a scraper, one of the horses, roan mare, balked, and Newton picked up a bowlder and struck the beast in the head with it. The animal fell and expired instantly. Considerable indignation was experienced by eye witnesses of the passionate action, but that was all.

A singular and almost fatal accident occurred at Snohomish the

other day. Arthur C. Knight and Giles Hoyle went to the slaughter house to butcher a steer. Hoyle raised his rifle and fired at the animal. The ball glanced from the skull, and striking a knot in a beam above, glanced through the roof of the building, and striking the left eye and ripping up two inches of his scalp. Had he stood an inch farther forward it would have killed him.

TEMPERANCE NOTES.

Continued from page 1.

The call for the annual meeting of the National W. C. T. U. of 1890 begins with an earnest and cordial invitation and commendation signed by all the officials of the State of Georgia.

The annual meeting will be held in Atlanta Nov. 14 and 15th inclusive. October 29 is set apart as a day of prayer in view of this meeting.

Since the passage of the Original Package bill, steps are being taken by the liquor dealers to test its constitutionality before the courts. During the debate in congress over this bill, it was declared by its opponents to be unconstitutional, and they assert the supreme court will so declare it in spite of the fact that congress acted on an suggestion in the Original Package decision of the U. S. Supreme Court, in framing the law.

It is interesting to note the force of the Original Package decision, aside from its bearing on prohibition states. Its force there was to nullify prohibition laws; but it was also fatal to High License. Sen. or Executive of West Virginia a High License Advocate in his speech in the senate said: "I comprehend this decision correctly should no action be taken in congress, what will be the effect in my state or in any state that now authorizes licenses to be issued with a view of controlling and regulating the sale of liquor? The effect will be that there will be no ports from whence the liquor of that state to any citizen or resident, for sale in original packages." Liquor in flasks or bottles as an article of commerce, the barter and exchange of which will be prohibited under this decision, constraining the provision of the federal constitution, and in a few months we will find bars open selling day-by-day with the men, who are honestly paying a license to the municipality, the county and the state for the privilege of exercising that selling, while those engaged in selling by original packages are receiving all the rewards and profits, without any of the liabilities and burdens assumed by the law abiding citizen who executes his bond with a heavy penalty and pays into the treasury an annual sum to secure this privilege.

But again the English Brewers' Syndicate, believe themselves exempt from license. Chicago, Harry Rubens the foreign brewers' attorney informed the Mayor that the brewers consider themselves pretty nearly as responsible as the city. That is to say, these foreign brewers propose to defy the high license law of Illinois, take the matter into the courts and thus keep the city out of its license for yours if not for ever.

The corporation counsel thinks outside companies should hardly be allowed to sell their beer with out license when Chicago local brewers are required to pay a license. He says: "There are a number of points on which we can trip them up, and I have no fear of the result. The effect is bad on other brewing interests, however. The United States Brewing Company, which was formed out of Bartholomae & Leitch, M. Brand and Ernst Bros., now comes to the front, and only wants to pay one license of \$500, whereas it has three breweries which have always paid \$500 each. I don't see what is getting into the brewers—they must want the earth." Of course they do! and we shall have reason to be grateful to the English Brewers' Syndicate if they but open the eyes of every city council in the land to the fact. This we see that English Brewers will be ready to lend a helping hand in the effort to overthrow the original Package laws. That would mean free whisky. Terrible as that seems, it would not be a long step toward National Prohibition?

Slaughter of Sheep.

Salem Journal: The overland passenger train going south a night or two ago ran into a band of sheep on the Cross place not far from the regular "home-yard," killing fifteen sheep, and the funeral was held next day. "Section" Foreman Prunty, being master of ceremonies, while his gang of Chinamen scooped out two large pits and dumped the gathered carcasses therein. Prunty has had more experience as superintendent of grave digging than any man on the road, thus earning the slight change of title. The sheep were the property of P. M. Henshaw, who had them pastured along the unfenced railroad, and will be compensated by the company, who have paid enough for slaughtered stock in that neighborhood to fence several miles.

An Artesian Well.

Warm Spring Johnny, who lives on the peninsula formed by the confluence of the Clatsop and Willamette, and works a garden, has here done depend upon a spring for water. But this year the spring went dry, and he informs a Herald reporter that he put down a well. At the depth of 48 feet he struck a flowing vein of pure cold water, that at first came out several feet into the air and still continues to run with force and has finely irrigated his garden. That being the case the water should be taken into use, perhaps a sufficient quantity will be struck to supply the city with good pure water.

A Movement in Wheat.

Ten teams will commence today the work of hauling 20,000 bushels of wheat from Tangent to this city. The rates over the Southern Pacific between the two points being such as to justify this mode of shipping. The wheat is for San Francisco firms, and will be shipped over the Oregon Pacific via Yaquina to California's metropolis.

RAILROAD LIBRARIES.

They Are to be Established Along the Line—Pendleton to Have One.

Pendleton East Oregonian.

Mr. C. L. Gates, representing the railroad department of the Young Men's Christian Association, is in the city seeking a suitable location for a railroad library. These libraries will be established at points along the line from Portland to Grand Island. Three have already been placed in operation, one at Ogden, one at Rawlins, and another at Pocatello. Fourteen more will be established at a cost of \$22,000, not including operating expenses.

Pendleton will be the first point to have one east of Portland. One will also be established at Tekoa for the benefit of the railroad boys on the eastern division.

There will be reading, amusement and bath rooms in connection with each library, and 400 volumes of the literature will be placed at the disposal of members. No better place in the world could be found for the boys to spend their spare time. Monthly entertainments of a social nature will be given for their amusement, and lectures on mechanical topics for their instruction.

The object of the scheme is a commendable one. It is intended that the company may engage in a sort of friendly partnership with its men for mutual benefit. While the libraries will be conducted under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., Vice-President Holcomb is understood to be back of the project.

The membership fee is a mere nothing—\$2.50 a year. Membership is limited to railroaders.
