HAVE KNOTS AND GRAIN.

Points in Which all Diamond Resem- bles a Piece of Wood.

In cutting a diamond, sometimes a knot is discovered. These are little substances as much harder than the diamond itself as you can imagine. They are to the stone the same as a knot in a pine board. When a diamond with these characteristics is discovered it has the same effect on the polisher that striking of a nail has upon a carpenter when he is working on a board. It takes no time to sand down to polish a knot, stone, and I have known a year's work to be put in on one stone of course, not of constant labor, but to be picked up at odd times when there was nothing to do.

The clothes has also to guard against chipping the stone, or if it be under the diamond and has a grain the same as a piece of wood, and the east car business might result in a chip of it, this is of its weight. While diamonds of this kind are not infrequently sold on the result of the inexperienced or laxity in part of the workman. When a polisher has a stone of this kind in his hands to find out the direction of its grain so as not to cut against it.

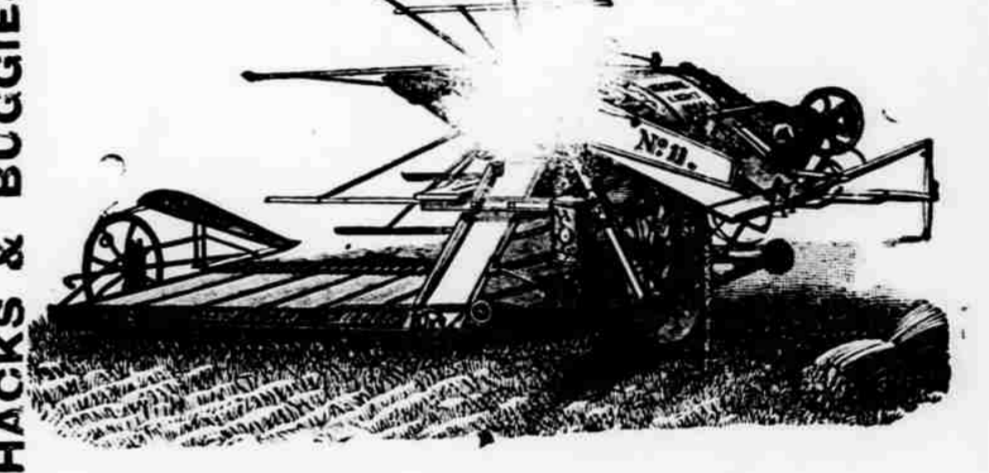
